


As well as beating previous financial records, *The Patsy* proved to be a dramatic highlight in the career of the Senior Class of 1938.



Those aforementioned, as well as those who also did their share before the footlights and in back of the scenery, deserve a great deal of credit for having made this year's G.O. Show another smashing success. Organized in 1929, the *Maroon Echo* has had eight successful years under able leaders and staffs. This year's staff of thirty-five members was headed by Kenneth Rothwell, editor-in-chief, Louise Batlle, senior associate editor, and June Freeman and Nina Carlin, junior associate editors.

In addition to being a member of the National Scholastic Press Association and of the Columbia Scholastic Press Association, the *Maroon Echo* again received a third class high honor rating at the convention held on March 10, 11, and 12 by the Columbia Press Association at Columbia University. 


The newcomers included Jean Dill, Mary Rogers, Barbara Ward, Ellen Grampp, Jack Costello and Joseph Barabino.
