Working together as a team, the sophomore class begins to pile up the yardage that will carry them to victory.

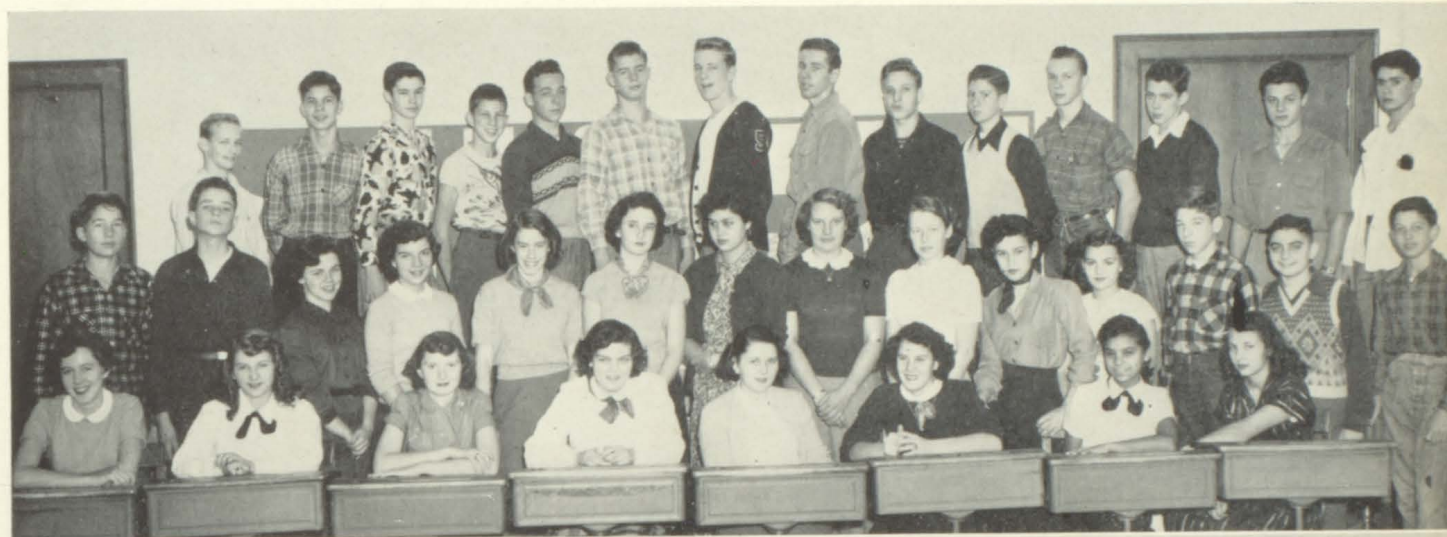

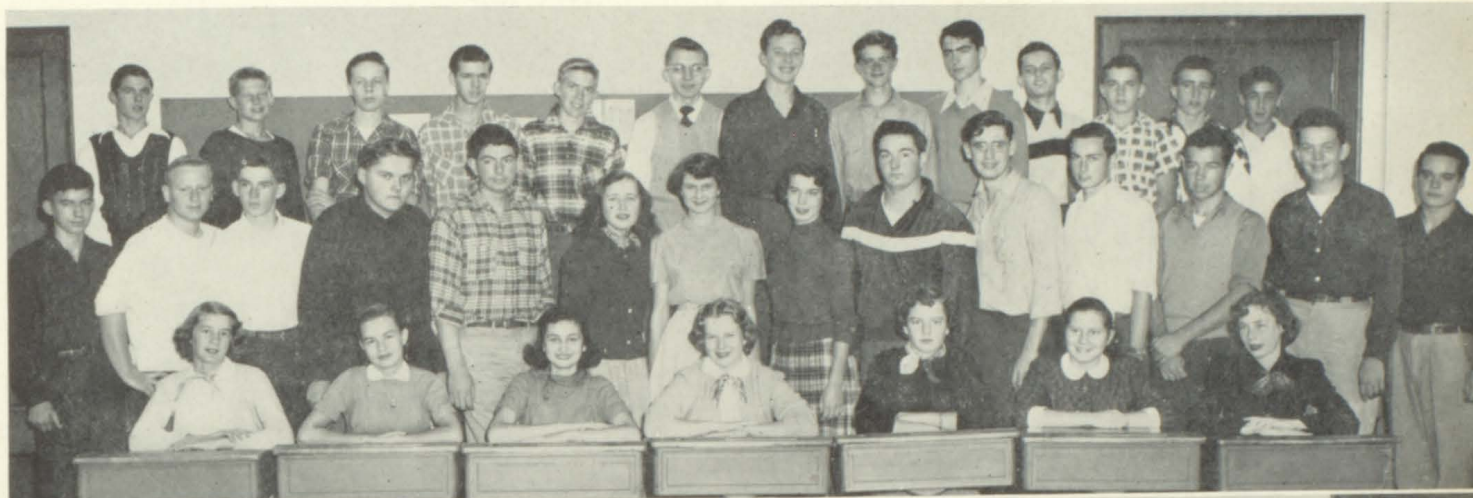
Financially, the Juniors are cheered to victory through successful sales of Maroon and White hats, stationery, and cakes.

As the outgoing senior class leaves the field, the second string Juniors honor them at the traditionally lovely Junior Prom.



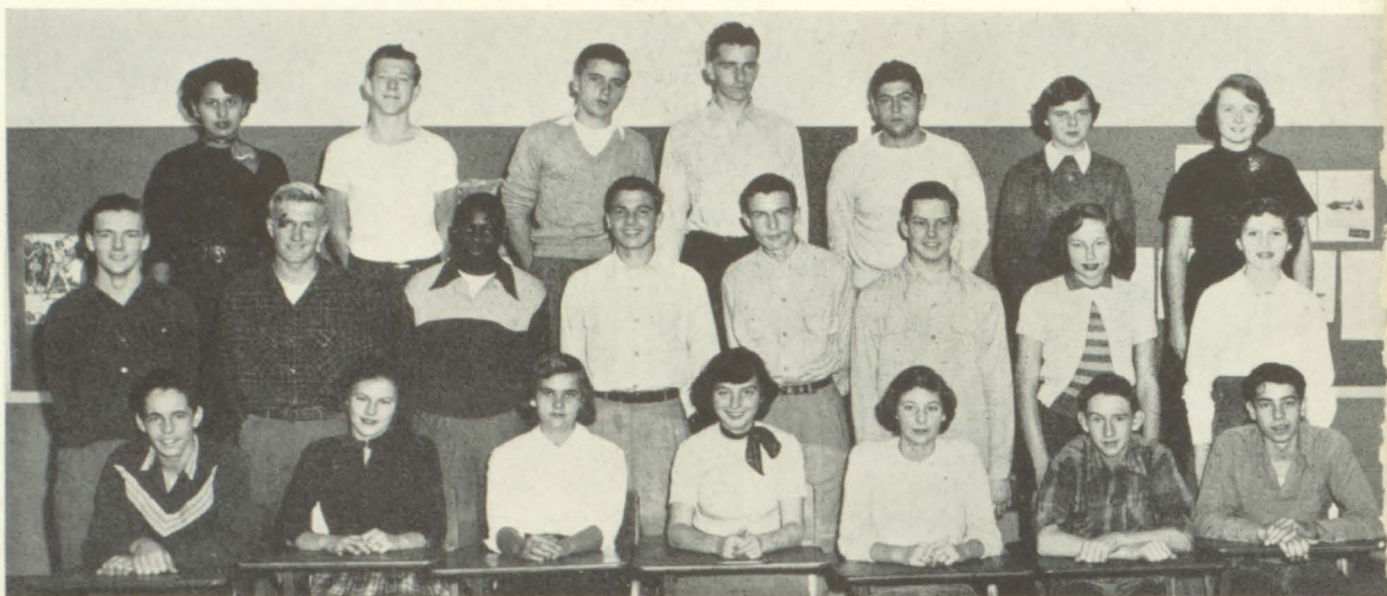

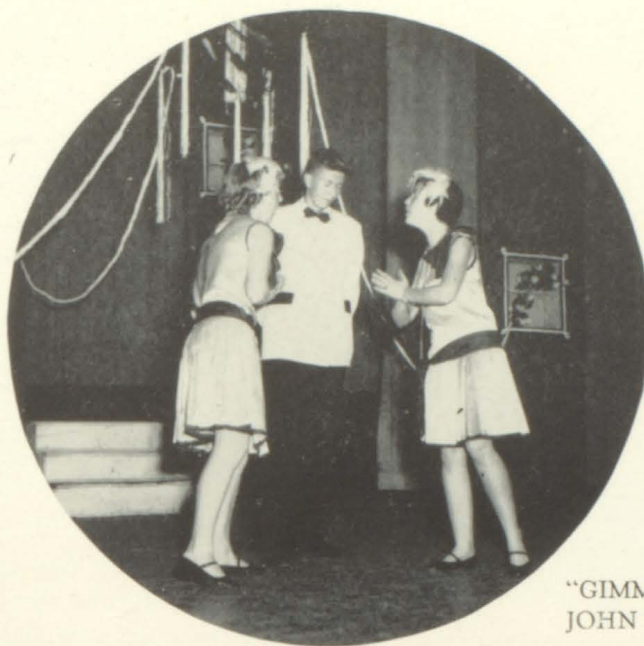

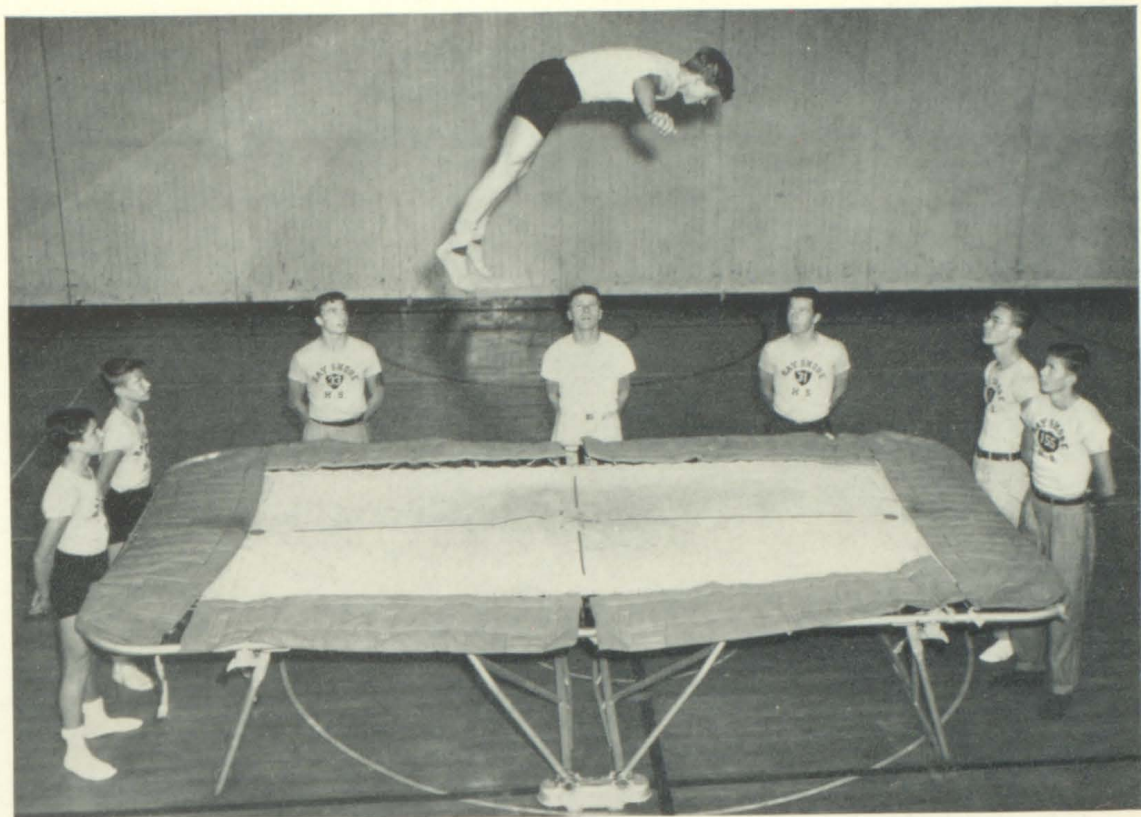

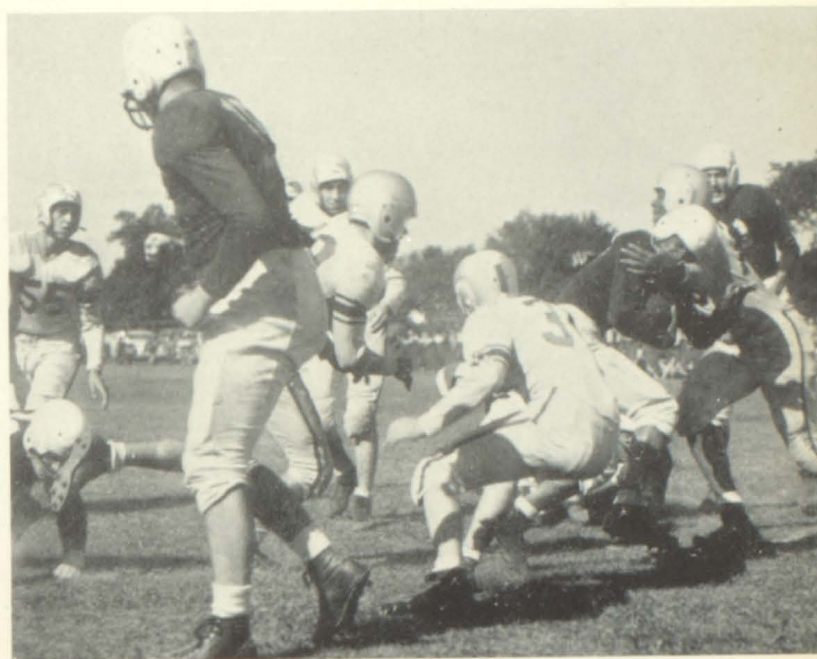

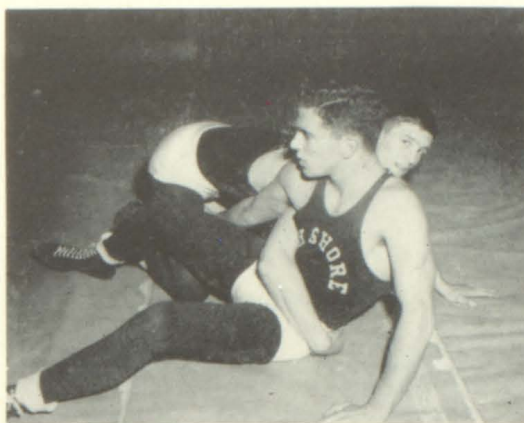
All the boys worked hard to make a strong Bay Shore team as their nine wins out of twelve record show.
