










### Junior Variety Show— 1952





Complications enter as do Spike, and his cohorts, following which we see a colorful bullfight between Spike and Ricky, already rivals for Joan's affections.

Nor will we forget Ralph as he rehearses for the War Benefit Ball, later in the play, when the hardships of World War II help the youngsters to grow up and face life.
