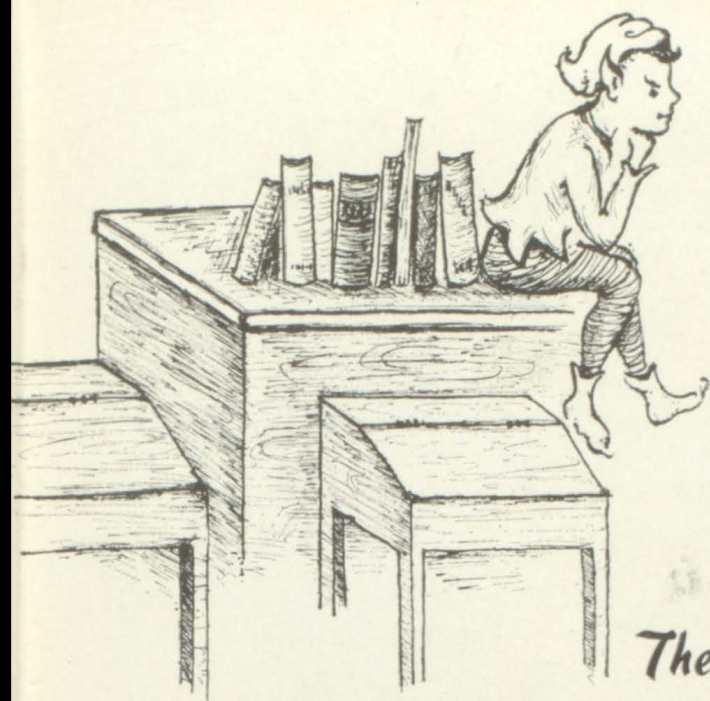

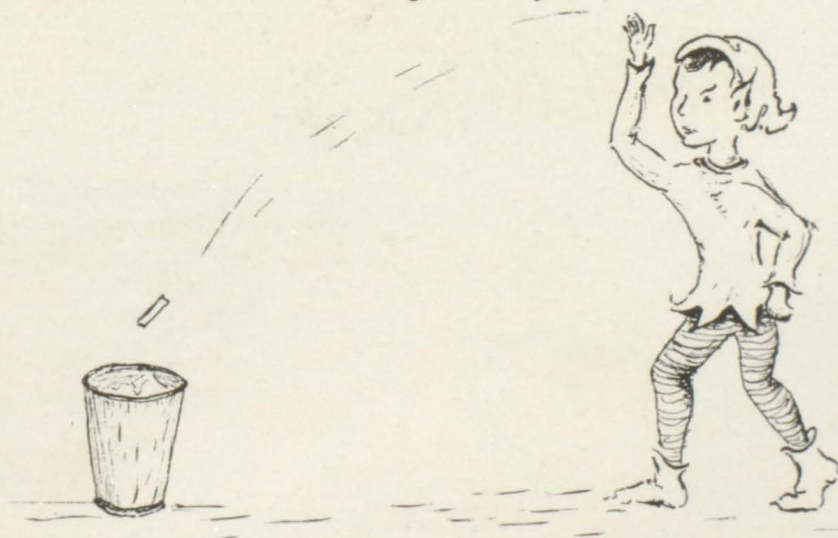
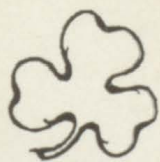




The "Quiet Man" with the crooked pipe and the eager class of '54 arrived at Bay Shore together, beginning a colorful and rewarding association.

Amidst volleys of flying chalk and threats of being "thumped", Mr. Martin has inspired us with his own "joie de vivre" all through our high school career.

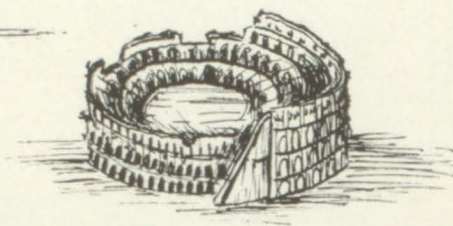

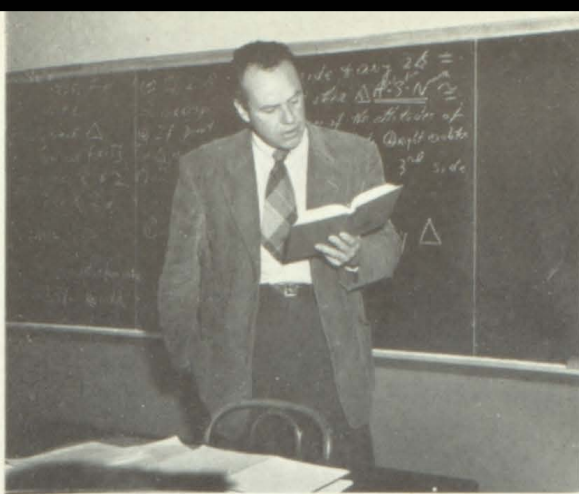
Followers of Socrates

young knights appear—matching skills in jousts, to win the favor of a lady; the swaggering duelists who fought over the drop of a hat, for honor.

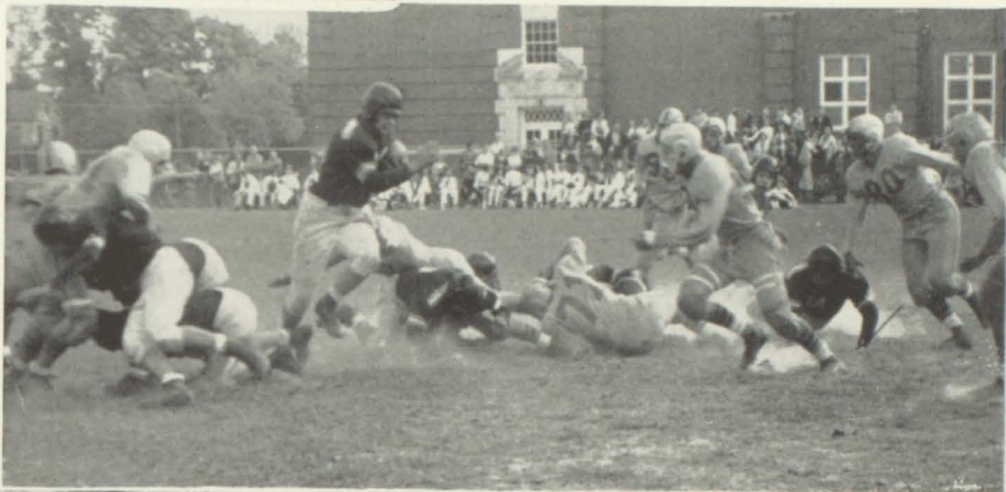

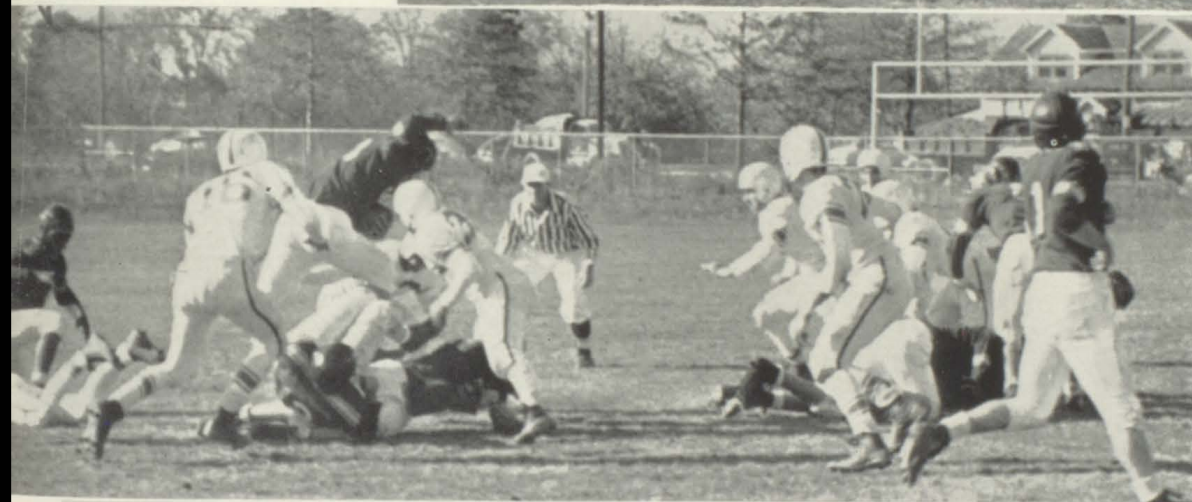
too much about the game but with an eye on the catcher. And there's nothing like track and tennis, we've been told, to whip up an appetite.

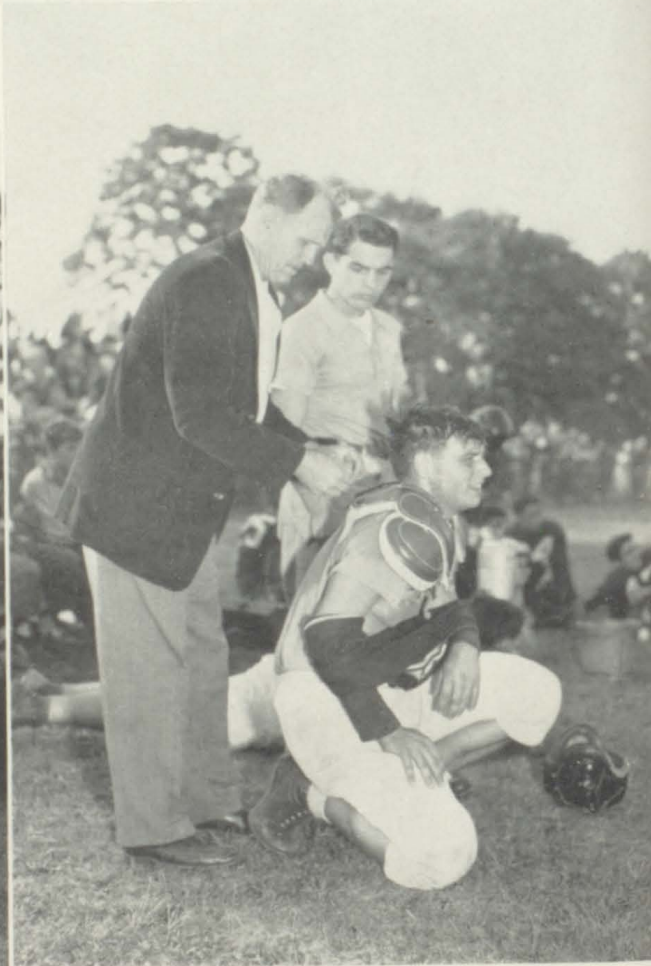

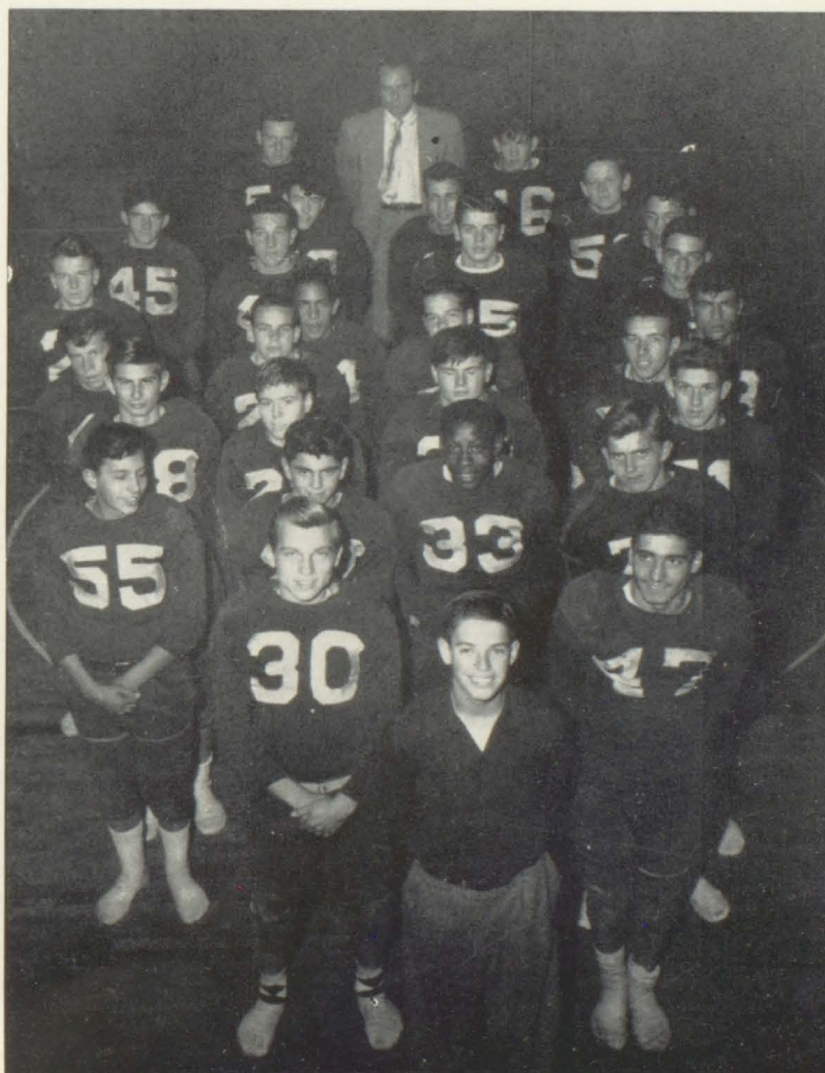
The 1953 squad captured a scoring record by trouncing Lindenhurst 61-0.

Swiftly rides the courier bringing the news of the day to the towns people.

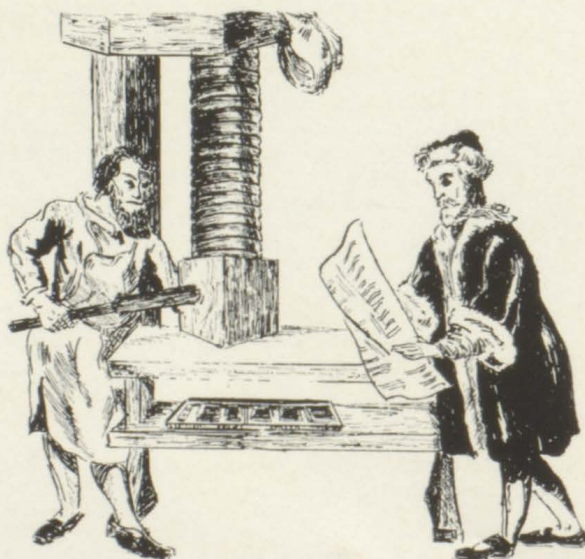
The Maroon Echo faithfully and fancifully relates the current events of the school to its student readers.

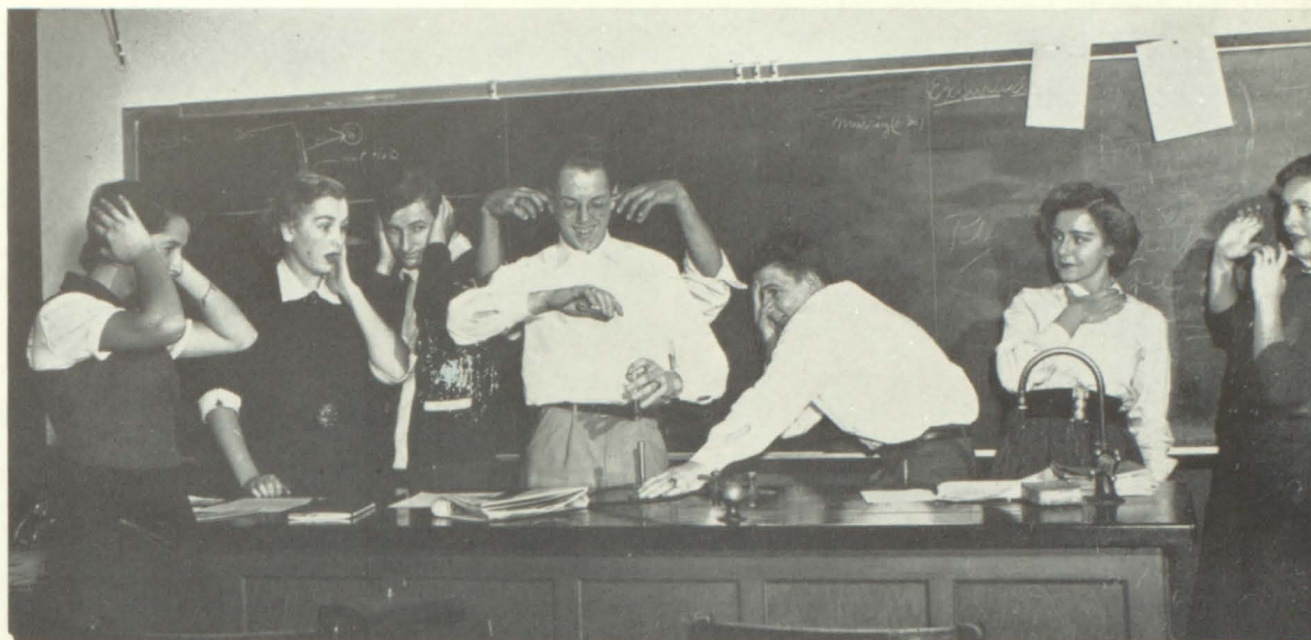
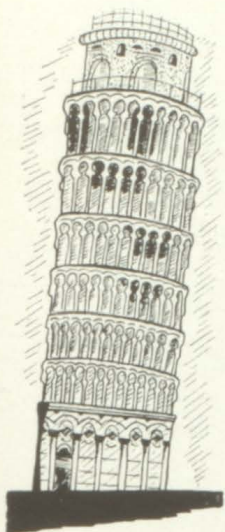

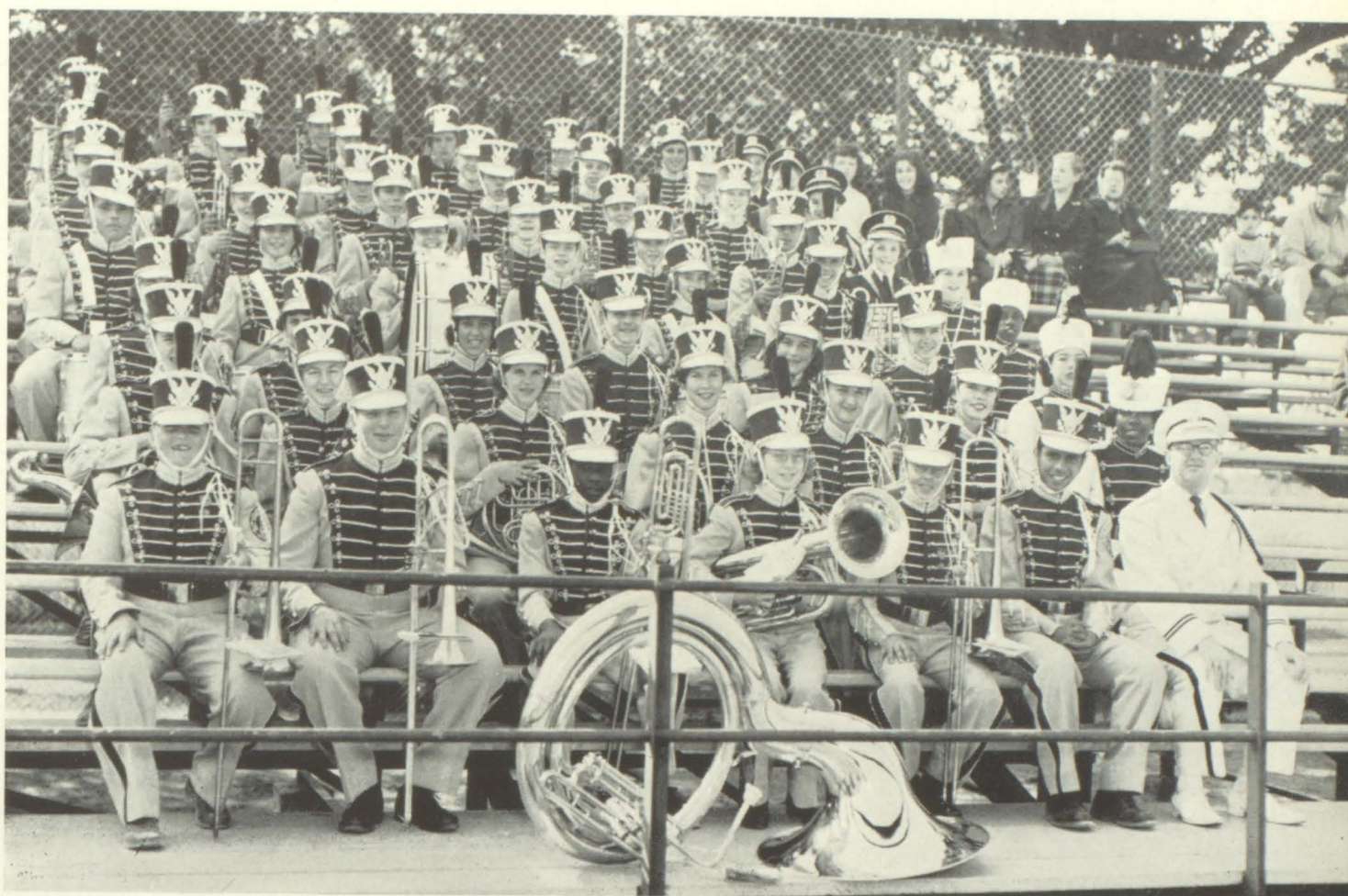
The crowd looks anxiously up the street from which the band is to come.
