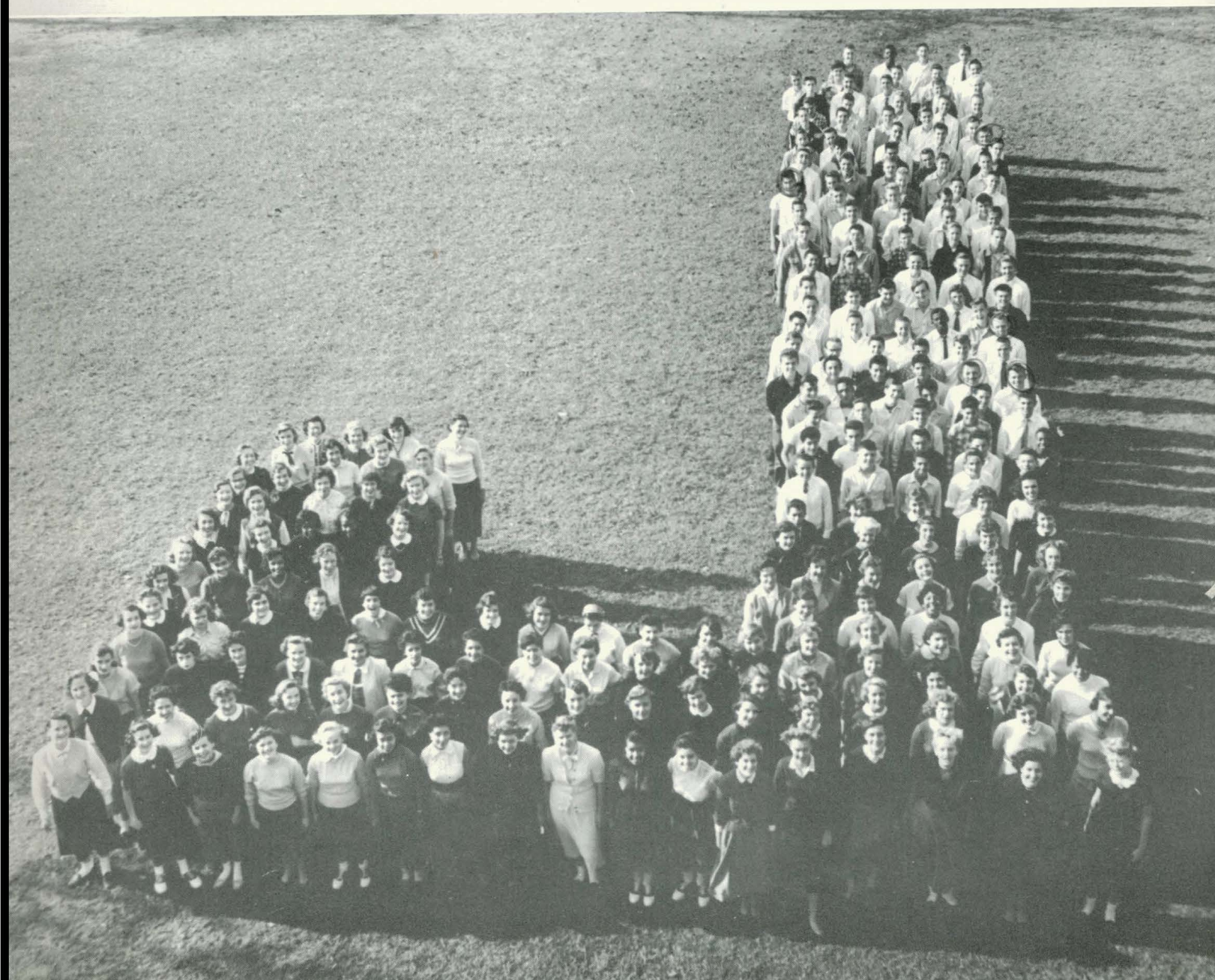
Some of the activities of the Juniors in this "in between" year were the one-act play, the Junior-Sophomore dance and the variety show.

## LEADERS CLUB

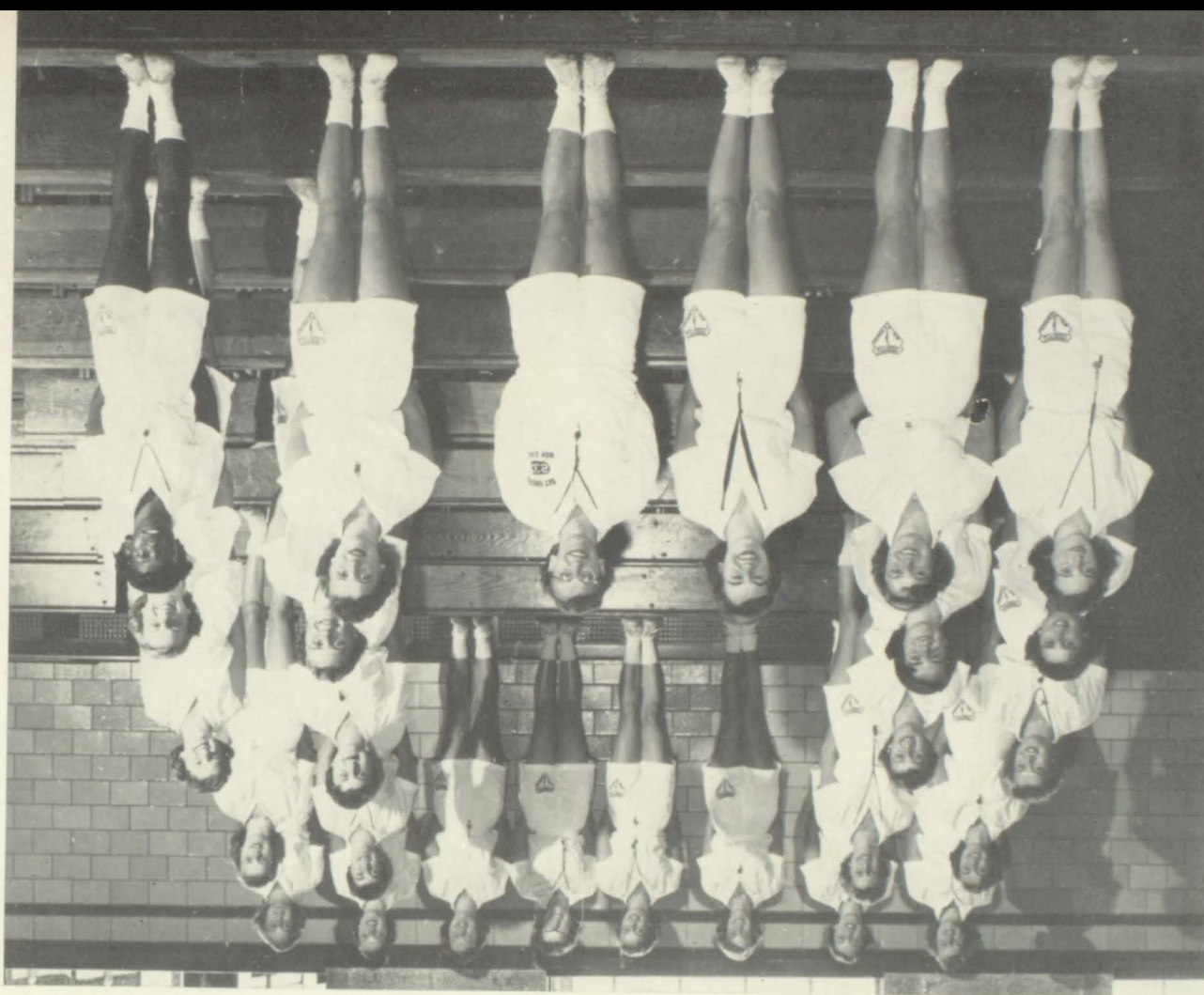
