
Experiences


Dignity, however, was the order of the day. The team kept its poise and finished the season with impressive play all around that made all the sweat worthwhile.






"When I'm out there," said Bill DeProspo, "... I just figure that everyone is just a high school kid, and we all feel the same pressure."


"I don't know if it does any good," confessed one plucky fan about her shouts and cheers, "but even if it helps a little, then it's all right. This is my team and I want them to win."

The defense was led by Tim Cox and Joe Puzo, with other stalwarts on that squad being Gerald Preston, Rich Fredricks, and Jim Mickens.





This pretty well sums up the feelings of a dedicated group.










An "A" For Effort


A Season Most Coachs Dream About










They run for pleasure

At any time, on any day, you might see them. Young, clad in sweat suits of various colors, they are running down the main roads and side streets of Bay Shore.


















Innovations

The results were that students were greeted the first day of school by a copy of the Maroon Echo, and the editors were greeted at the first general meeting by an overwhelming number of people.


Unusually good writing in the next issue delighted the editors as the business staff sold an unprecedented

Our last section is completely new. In the face of continually rising costs we long ago scrapped plans for a more elaborate production, and introduced, for the first time in Bay Shore history, advertising into a yearbook.

We see advertising as mutually beneficial. It provides us with otherwise unobtainable funds with which to offset rising costs (today, a 200 page yearbook, delivered can easily cost \$9000); at the same time it provides area businesses the opportunity to promote their business and to express their concern for Bay Shore High School. For their cooperation we thank these local businessmen.

Finally, there are our endsheets. These are a little different too, and by their simple directness and warmth they gave us a

chance to express our feeling of pride in this whole undertaking.

And so, with the fun, work, tears and laughter we've finally brought the Good Ship Lollipop home. We thank our many friends and determined, idealistic staff for their help, without which, of course, there would be no book.

Other annual events include a Christmas tea, sponsorship of the Shakespeare Festival, Christmas baskets and fund raising events.








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"The Name 'Marauder' Means Something

Bay Shore's 6'9" center bounced the ball stiffly a couple of times and set himself for the first of two shots. The ball swished cleanly through the net and the crowd shrieked with anticipation and encouragement.

Vesey steadied himself while both benches leaned forward nervously. The second free throw bounced agonizingly around the rim and finally dropped through. Immediately, the gym exploded with a roar from the crowd, and eight long seconds later, the Marauders raised their fists in victory as they trotted into the locker room.



Ricky Parks sighed as he recalled the event. "Man, that was one of my worst games I've ever played," he shook his head. "I couldn't do anything right—I was so nervous. But still, that Deer Park game had to be one of the most exciting this season. It was tense, all right."

Playing on the basketball team for Bay Shore and performing well is considered a responsibility, even an obligation, by most of the players. "There's a special kind of pressure here," the forward continued. "The team has always had a winning tradition . . . the name 'Marauder' means something. We have to win . . . we're supposed to win . . . "

"Our offense," continued coach Karen Kauer, "has been one of our strong points this year and has really been a big factor in our success."




"I think we have a lot of capability to win the rest," said coach Linda Pulvermacher confidently.







The two oddly-clad athletes faced each other in the middle of the floor with arms held high. They moved for each other, brushed each other's hands aside, and stepped back to repeat the process.






It was just another match for Bay Shore's varsity wrestlers. The only problem for the matmen was coming out on top.








Our Basic Skills Are Excellent





Fans, Floats And Cheerleaders


For Student Scholarship






Many Bay Shore students participate in a vocational training program known as BOCES, for Board of Cooperative Educational Services.









The Band

The orchestra has participated in many concerts this year, playing selections such as Vivaldi's Cello Concerto, and Donald White's Divertissement No. 2 written in 1975.



Choir





Government Club





"You get a chance to meet kids outside the classroom. I get satisfaction from working with the kids. I enjoy watching the kids getting delight and enjoyment.


"You might influence one student. I like to watch the kids develop. What students really learn and keep they teach themselves."

As she would describe in a word-by-word account her efforts to provoke a smile from these elderly people—in that "never take a breath" style, that won her smiles everywhere—I couldn't help but develop an ever-growing soft spot in my heart for her.

Debbys' contributions, dedication, and indescribably bright personality all earned her the title of the 1975 Homecoming Queen. Her friends will remember her not only as the well dressed, golden haired girl that brightened the hallways of Bay Shore High School, but also as a symbol of happiness. Retiring

"I have very mixed feelings about leaving. It's taken me two years to make up my mind. I just don't like the kids I teach, I love them."

Miss Irmgard Wentzel is leaving Bay Shore High School after a "lifetime" of teaching. In a large sense Miss Wentzel has been teaching all her life. "It was always my ambition to teach." She states, "I started when I was seven years old. I tutored a little rich boy in our neighborhood for fun, but when they offered to pay me it took all the fun out of it."

In addition to her academic classes Miss Wentzel has been involved in many different extracurricular activities, ranging from advisor of the junior and senior classes to coaching basketball, archery, and even the football team. She explained how she happened to come upon this position, "No one wanted to do it, and we had to have a football team. So I decided to take the job. The boys were very understanding. They showed me what I needed to know and we took it from there." Miss Wentzel was

involved in so many activities that at one time she was advising fifty percent of the activities in Bay Shore High School. "When

I was senior class advisor we were averaging about ten to twelve activities a year. So it seemed like we were always either just finishing or just starting a new activity."

The percentage of kids who participate in extracurricular activities is very large even today, but doesn't seem to be quite as much over all participation as there used to be. "When I first came here there weren't so many distractions for the students-like television," Miss Wentzel explained. "I think this has had a lot to do with the decline of after school participation. But by the same token I think that the kids nowdays are smarter and more aware than when I first began teaching. Otherwise there is no difference. When I get a student in a class and I get to know them after a few days they're just as kind and sympathetic as they were thirty years ago."

Miss Wentzel has a number of post-retirement plans, but she is not exactly sure what she will concentrate on. Among other things Miss Wentzel hopes to be able to finish a book she has started to write. She also hopes to travel to Pitcairn Island and South Africa. Whether or not she will ever teach again is uncertain. "I don't really know exactly what I'll be doing next year. I'll just have to wait and see what happens." **Irmgard Wentzel**
