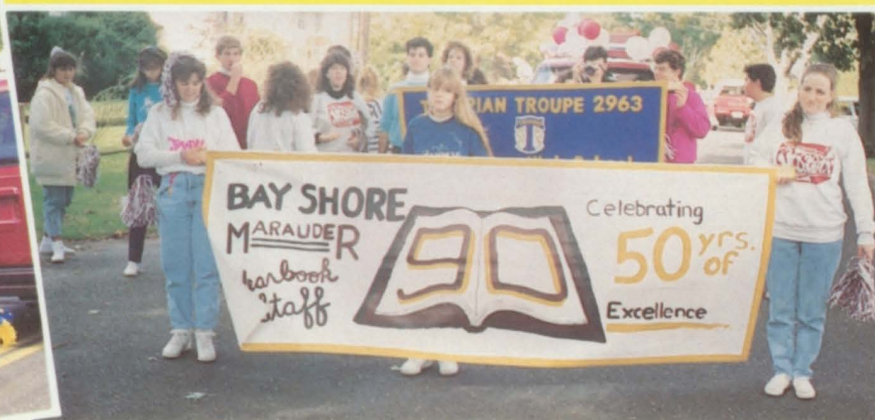


October 8, 1939, the dedication of our school

Up until a few years ago Bay Shore High School was really showing its age, but now with the impending Middle States evaluation and a new administrative team, the building has been undergoing a bit of cosmetic surgery. It started with the new windows, floors, roofs, doors, and stairwells and continued with new lockers, carpeted offices and freshly painted classrooms.

On Sunday, October 8, 1989 the building celebrated its fiftieth birthday in a style surpassed only by Mickey Mouse and Malcolm Forbes. Alumni and guests from the last fifty graduating classes roamed the halls and admired the changes and renovations in the building. They bought souvenir band hats, received mini footballs and seat cushions, and witnessed the official unveiling of the magnificent gym lobby. 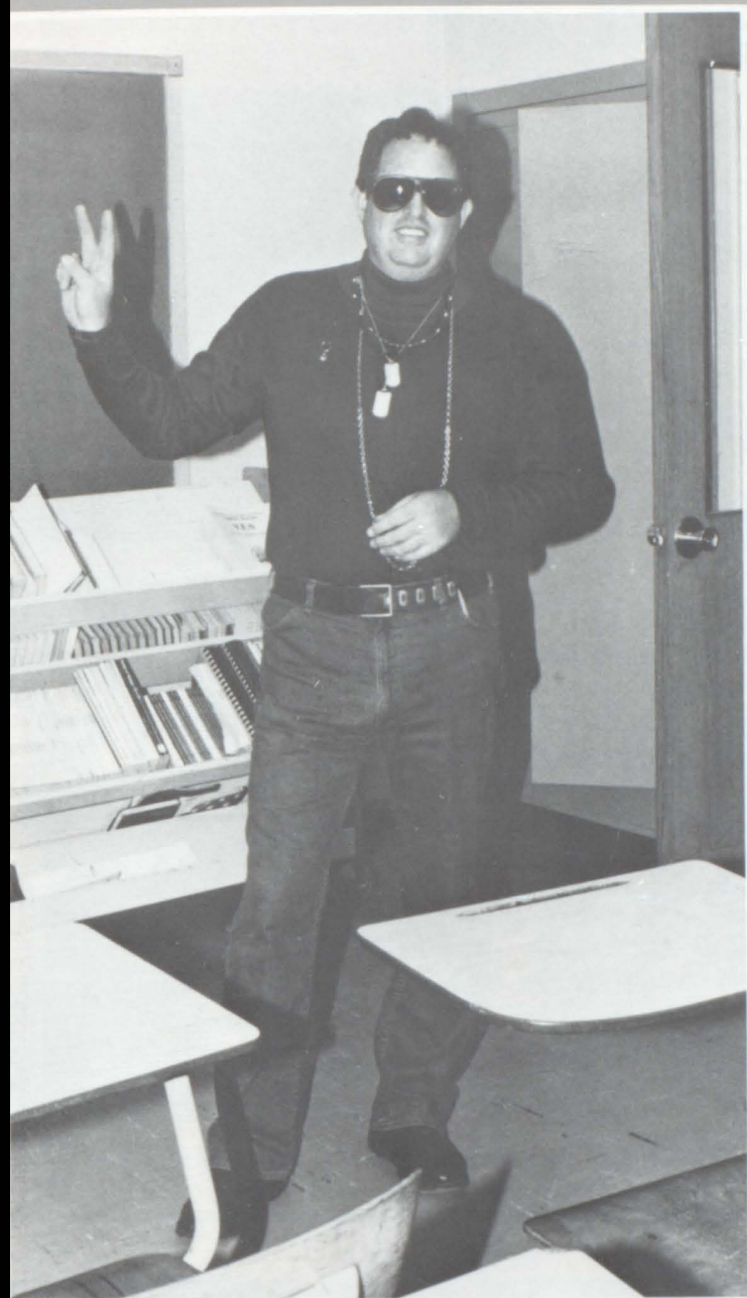

New Teachers on the Block

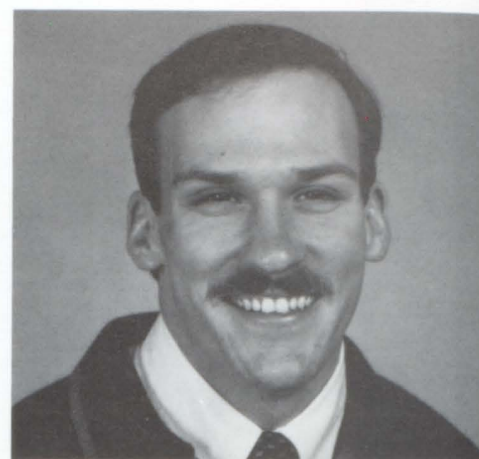
Although we are sad to see retiring teachers leave, new teachers add a spark to the learning process at Bay Shore.

Mr. D. Maloney is also one of our

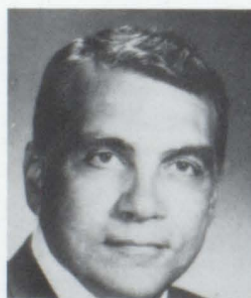

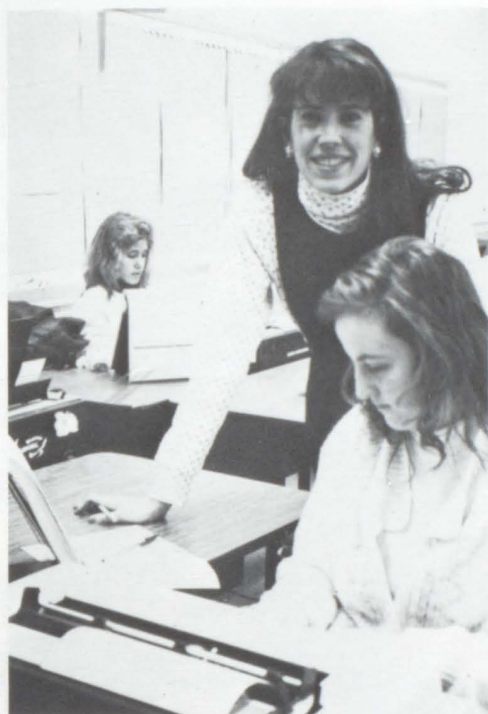

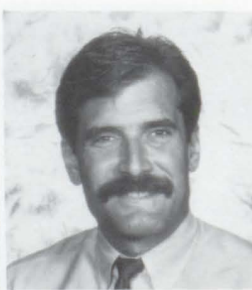

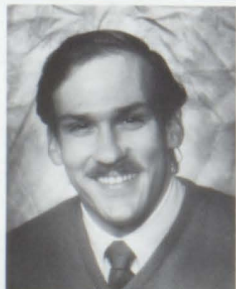

Rob Returns

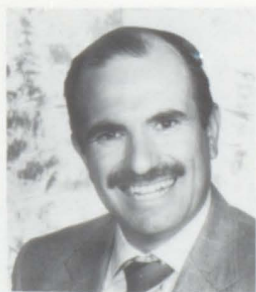

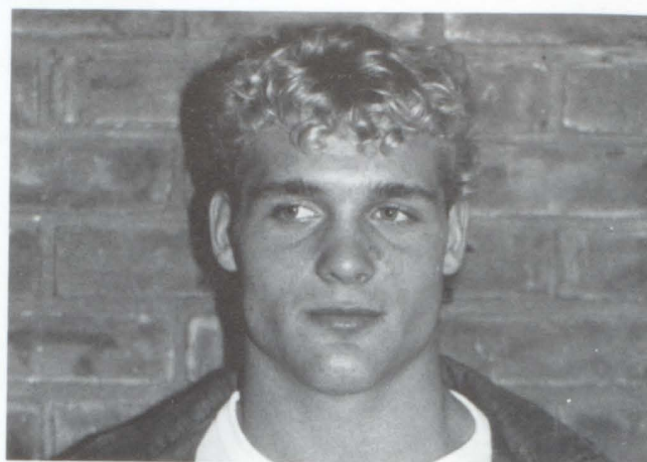
Joe Speaks Out

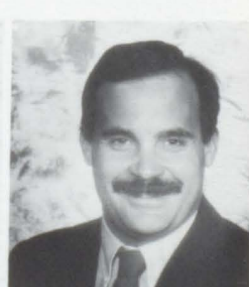
When asked if he had anything to tell the student body, he replied and stressed, "Don't be afraid to be yourself and never fall into peer pressure".

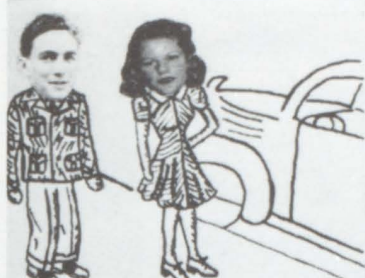

Mrs. Wells was one of 150 graduates who came to the high school when it first opened in 1939. She recalls that all were "excited about coming here". Every student in the first graduating class arrived as a senior and "loved it".

Walking through the building with her and her proud grandson, Joe Malchuski, was an exciting experience as she reminisced about her days. She recalls spending most of her free time off campus by a nearby brook, now only a vacant lot. The high school she attended was smaller because the new wing didn't exist. The lockers were in the same general area and the bathrooms were naturally "always filled with smoke". However, there was a different aura in the building. As she recalls, most rooms were more elaborately decorated with wood covered fixtures and shiny, new floors. To her, "The original building had much more charm."

She recalls a much smaller library stating that ours, "is almost as big as the public library." This is understandable considering that she attended Bay Shore before the new wing was even built. Mrs. Wells had no guidance counselors. She remembers the guidance office as a much larger room, and even after fifty years, she isn't sure of its function. She did state that the present "hodge-podge rooms" lack the dignity of yesterday's offices.

Her high school had no public phones; they just used the switchboard. In speaking with Mrs. Wells, it was refreshing to realize that she hadn't really changed much from her high school days. She was a member of the Phi Delta Sigma Sorority, was involved in a musical theater production, and was voted "best dressed" in her class. She proudly stated "I regret nothing." It was interesting to watch her in her Keds, jeans, and Champion sweat shirt; glimpses of the sorority girl became evident as she spoke.

Mrs. Wells' goals in life were to live "in a house surrounded by a white picket fence." This wish she proudly fulfilled. Echoing the sentiments of today's students, she said, "I wasn't interested in education. I just wanted to get out of school." However, her advice to students was, "Definitely go to college; you've got to go in order to live."

Ambulance Volunteers

The Emergency Services System is a chain of human and physical resources that was set up to provide complete emergency care. An Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) is trained and certified to provide this professional-level care at the scene as well as during transport to a medical facility.

The Bay Shore-Brightwaters area has always had an active emergency service as well as a program to train students in first-aid and follow-up care. Ray Wilson, a state-certified EMT volunteer, with the assistance of senior Jeannine Craddock, also an EMT volunteer, will be teaching Bay Shore High School students to become EMT's.

The students who are involved in the program are Ana Iris Figueroa, Claudia Diaz, Robert Flower, and Darius Danzy.

The program consists of learning CPR, techniques in bandaging, methods of splinting, and how to provide proper

care for patients. They will be taught to use the modern equipment and the facilities in the ambulance, while receiving training. All students have duty shifts during which they will respond to calls.

Since 1958, the Bay Shore-Brightwaters Rescue Ambulance Service has provided high-quality ambulance care. Having only one ambulance at the beginning, the core now boasts four, and has over 200 members.

Besides teaching the students medical techniques and terminology that is needed, the training is also designed to provide leadership skills, the ability to improvise, and how to be calm and react objectively in crisis situations.

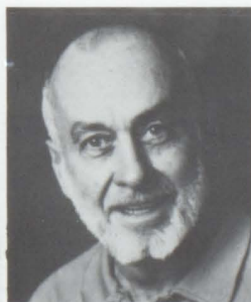

No Longer Just "Shop"

Technology Today

The Industrial Arts division of education has not been immune to the curriculum changes made by New York State Board of Regents. Their revamping of curriculum has left many teachers in turmoil due to the radically different courses they are required to teach. Technology, as it is now called, has been subject to updating, and is now a far cry from the stereotypical "shop" classes taught less than five years ago.

Shop used to be a course where one would find two types of students: those with aptitude and a liking for a hands-on type of class, and those with a history of disciplinary or academic problems. The latter group has troubled Industrial Arts teachers for years. Shop was used as a dumping ground for problem students.

More recently, shop evolved into Industrial Arts. The curriculum was broadened in scope by adding more theory and less hands-on time. Teachers were required to give more written work on material covered in textbooks and classroom activities.

Today, Industrial Arts has been updated into Technology. The most basic course, Intro. to Technology, spans a diverse area of topics. It now bears more resemblance to a standard classroom curriculum.

As a part of the attempt by the state to standardize elective courses, different parts of the same overall curriculum are taught in each of three elective classes: business, home economics, and technology. Each course is divided into four "modules". Two of the four are taught in all three courses. The remaining two modules are different for each course.

In technology, for example, the two different modules are light construction and manufacturing. Students begin the course alternating between building projects and learning mass-production techniques.

As the year progresses, they are given more freedom of choice in the projects that they make. Students are required to learn technical drawing and are expected to design and draw each

project before it is built. Once having mastered the basics, they are allowed to integrate their own ideas into their work. Students are allowed to work at their own pace; they do not have to wait for those who are having problems with their project.

The future for Technology looks promising. The state is looking to incorporate more high-tech courses into the curriculum. One probability is introducing a CADD (Computer Aided Design and Drafting) program into the shop. It would allow the students to familiarize themselves with a computer system, and gives them the opportunity to design more complicated projects.

Technology has become a progressive course with many students having diverse abilities and interests. The actions taken by the Board of Regents are gradually bringing Technology, and other elective courses, out of the cold and into the mainstream of education.

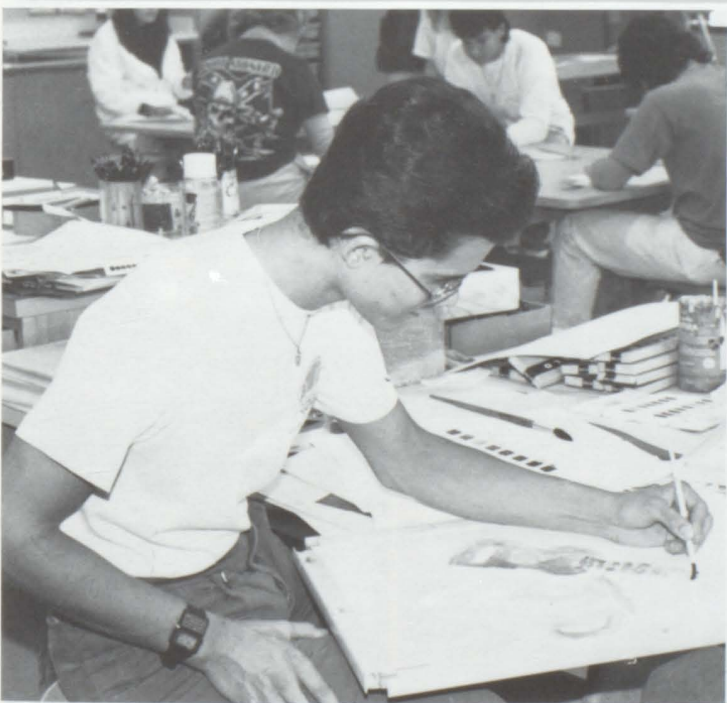

Computerized Assistance

Term paper time again? Or has your teacher suddenly insisted that your handwriting is illegible? These used to be problems for some students; however, now there is a solution. The new Writing Center provides an opportunity for students to have access to a multitude of resources to facilitate writing.

Equipped with eight IBM PC's which are usually loaded with a word processor, the center is open to all students during their free periods or after dismissal. 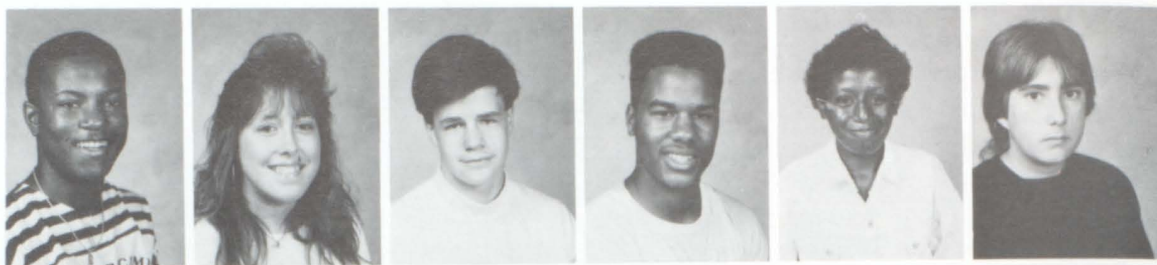

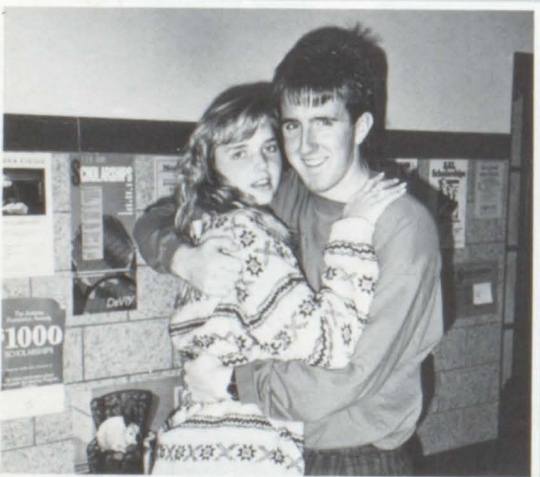

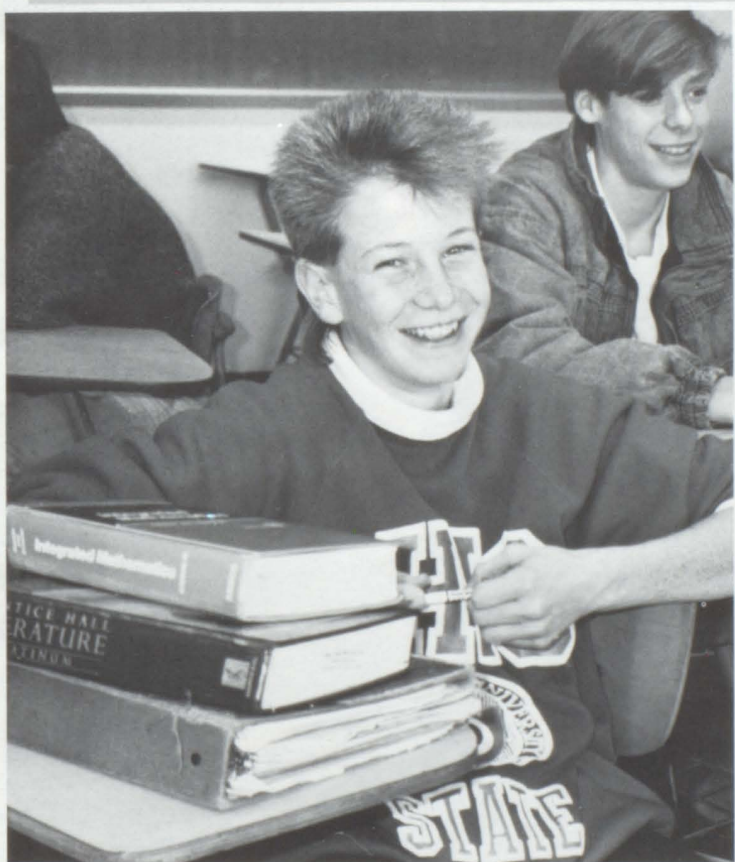
Marty believes that his position is important, and because of this, it requires a great deal of his, and the other

This total involvement is clearly evident during lunch time, when the class is busy working in the cafeteria. They are active and present at many

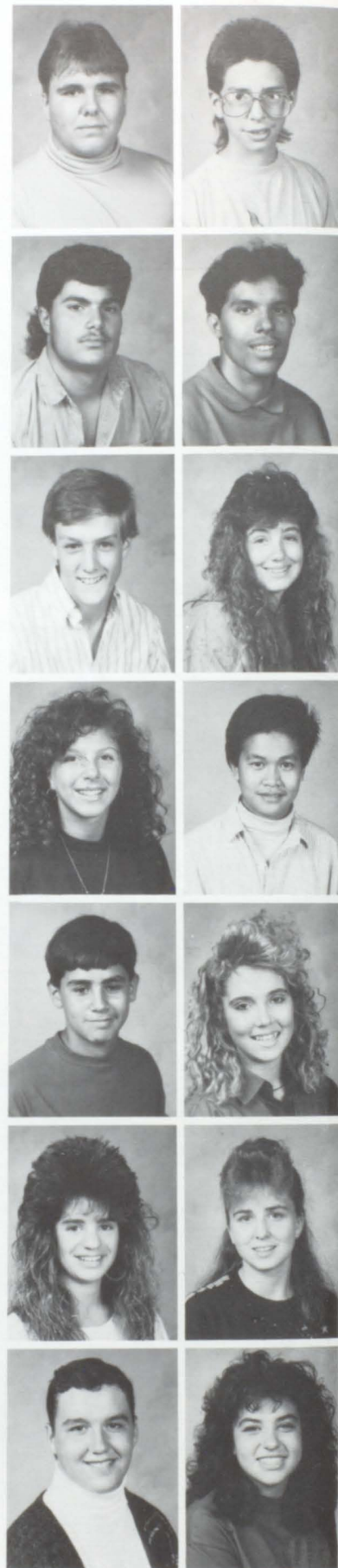
social events, such as the Senior Class Fashion Show where they led the Pledge of Allegiance and modelled with the seniors.

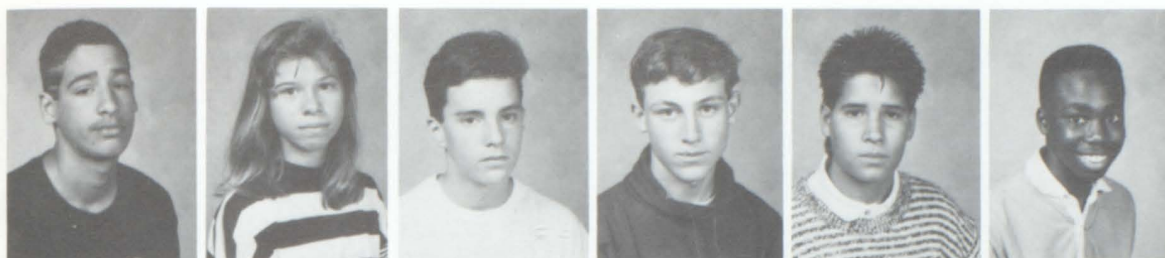

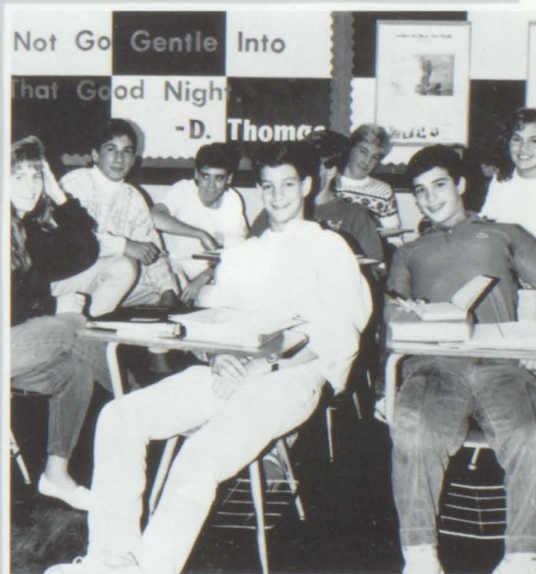

mine."

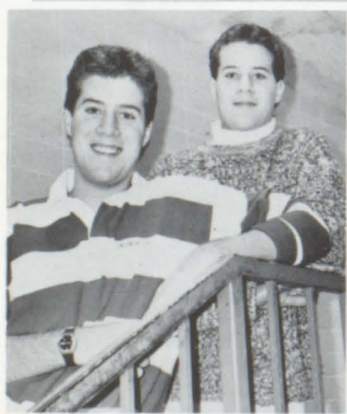

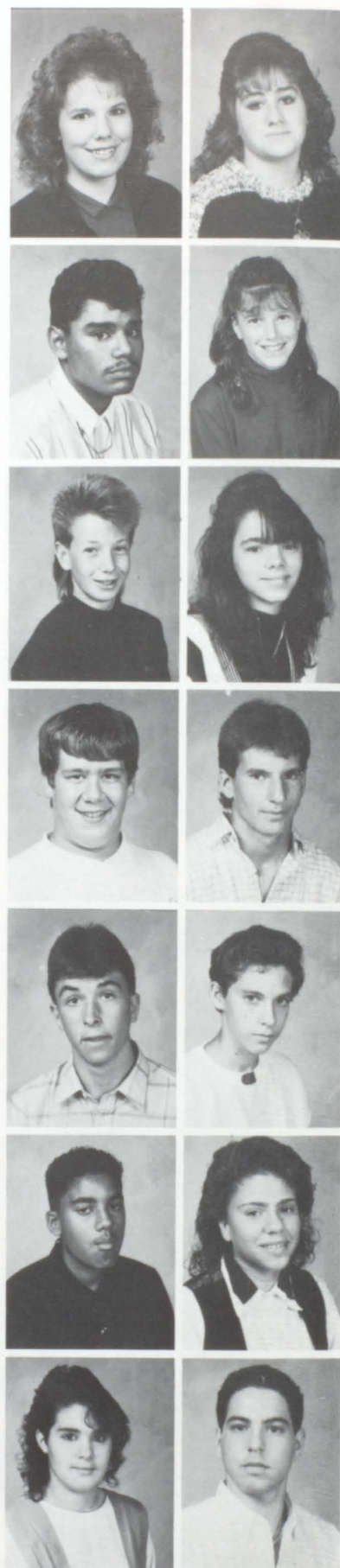

These tales are unique to this year's freshmen class and will probably continue to trouble freshmen for the next fifty years.

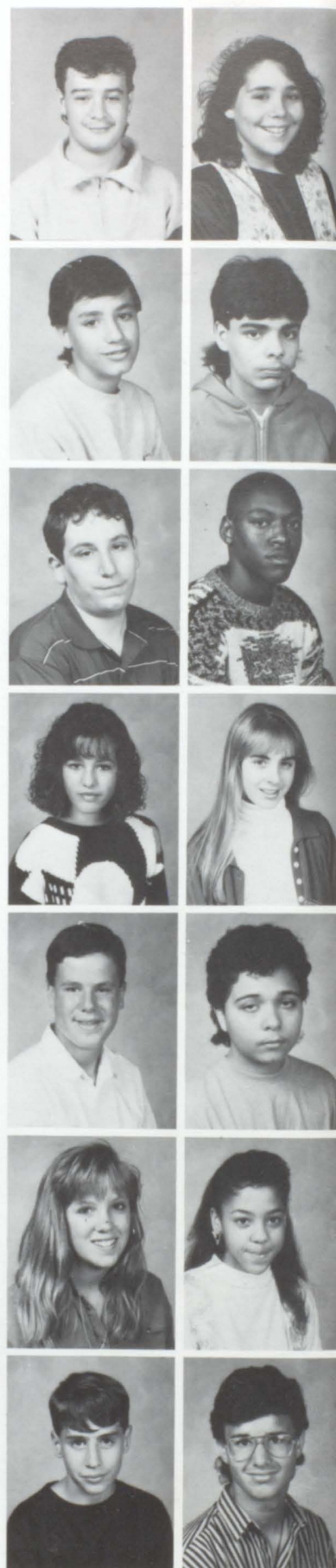

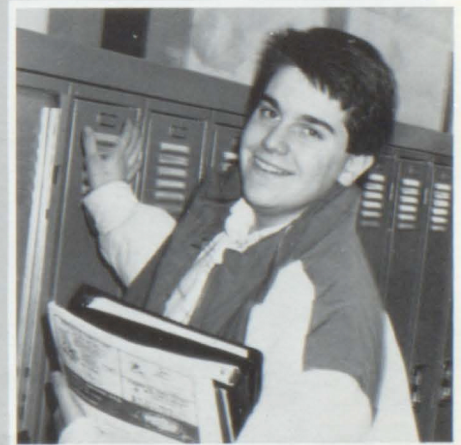

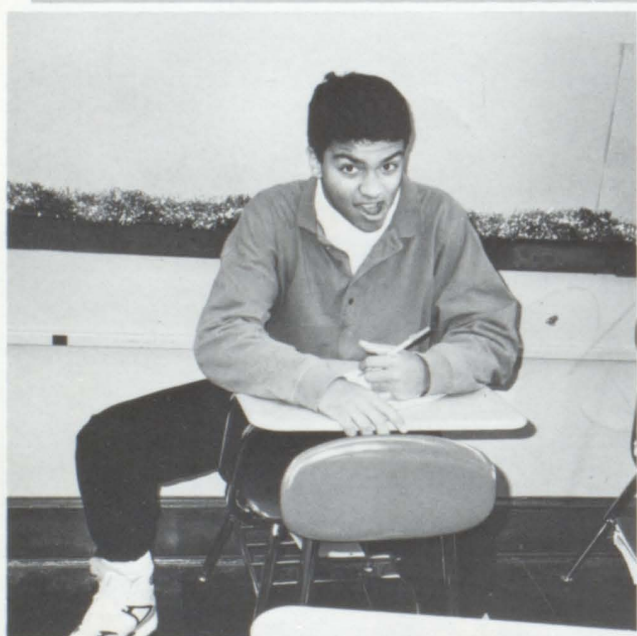
Putting Freshmen to the Test

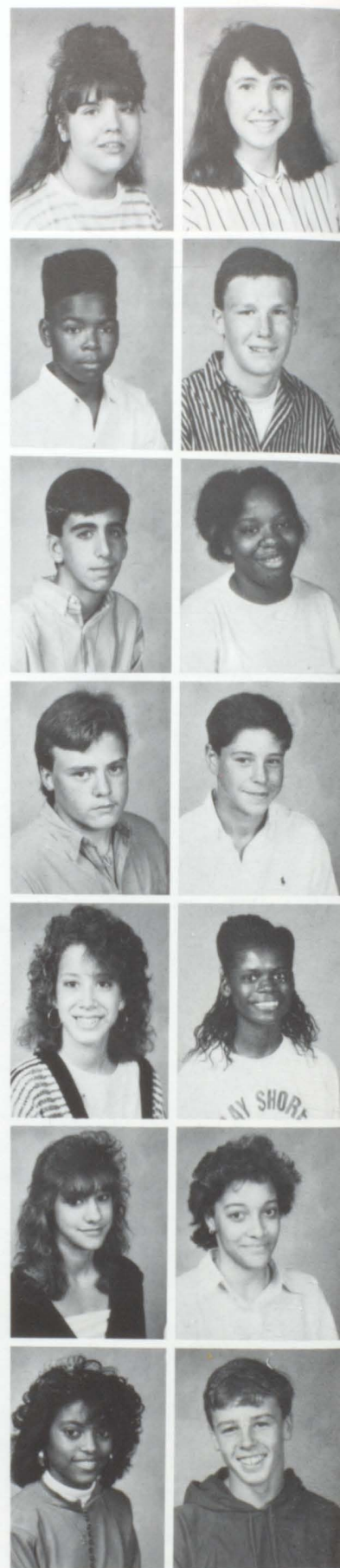

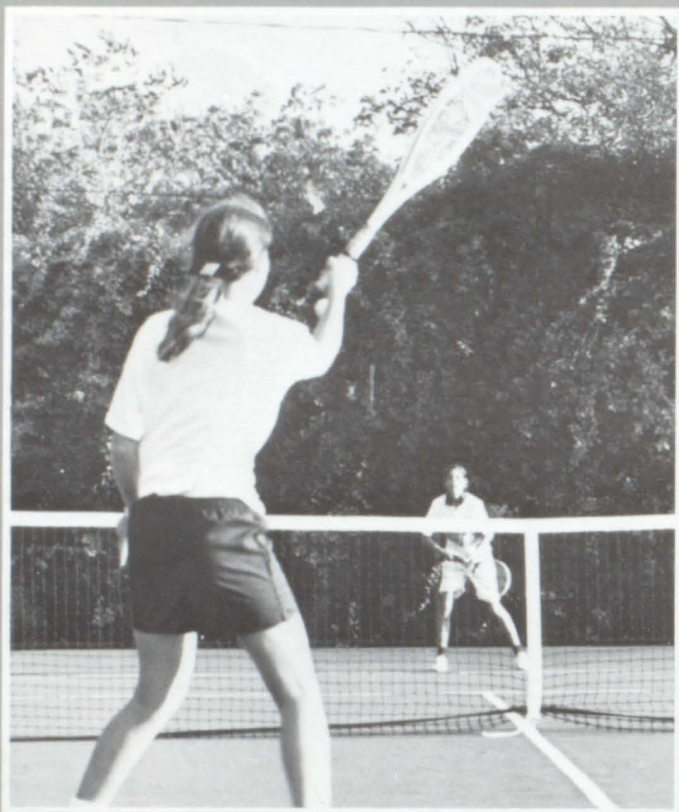

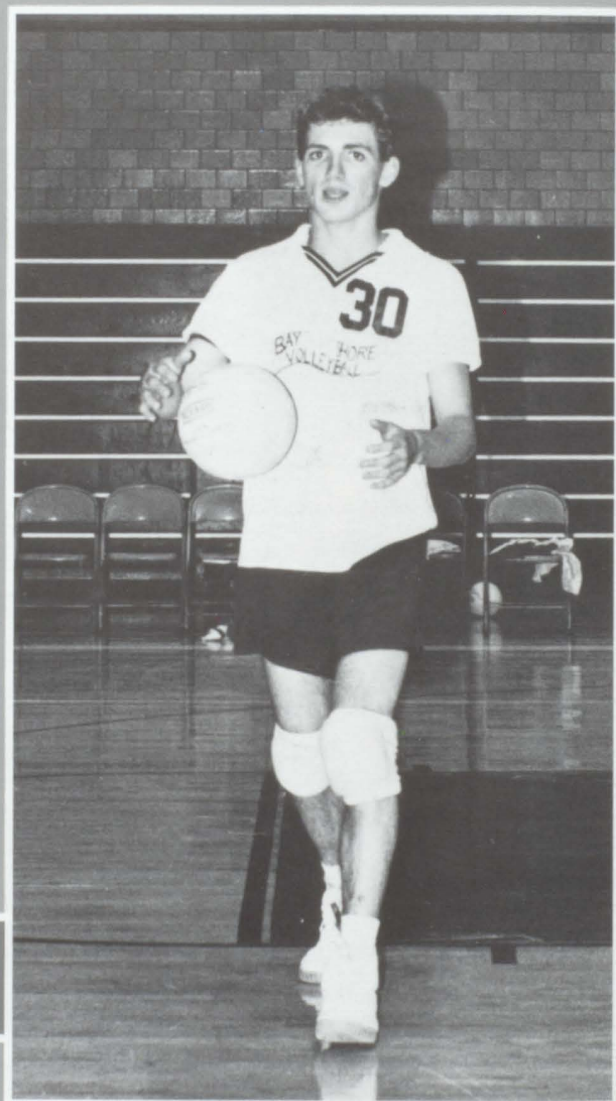

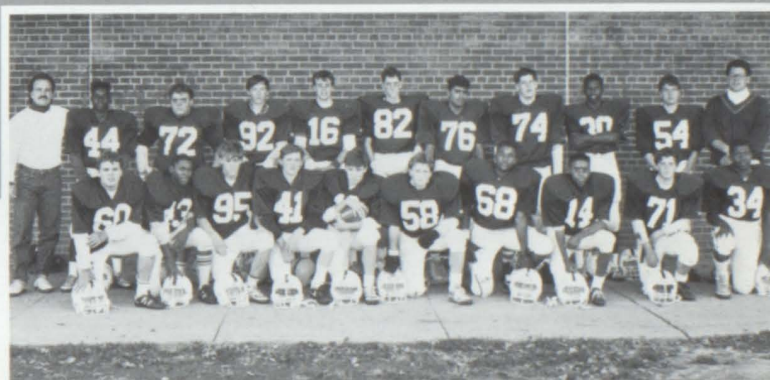

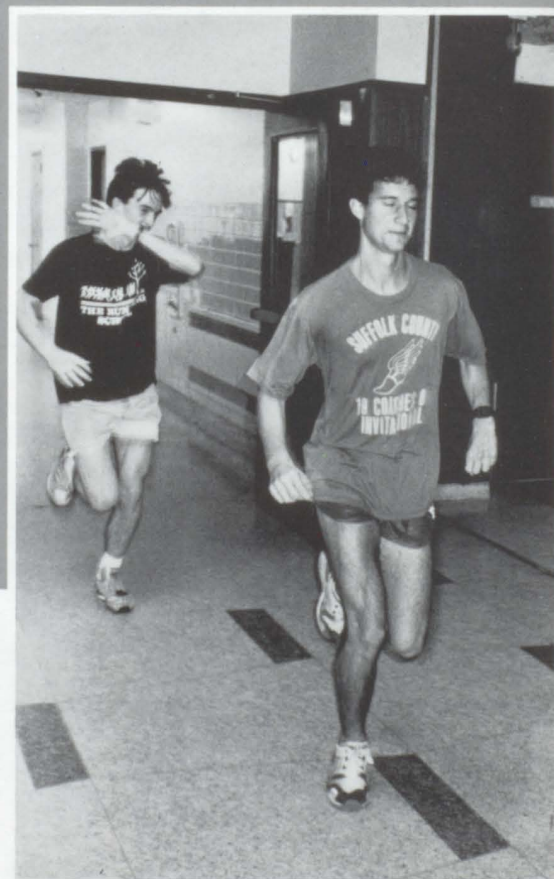
Running to Keep... A Winning Tradition

eing a successful gymnast takes more than talent.

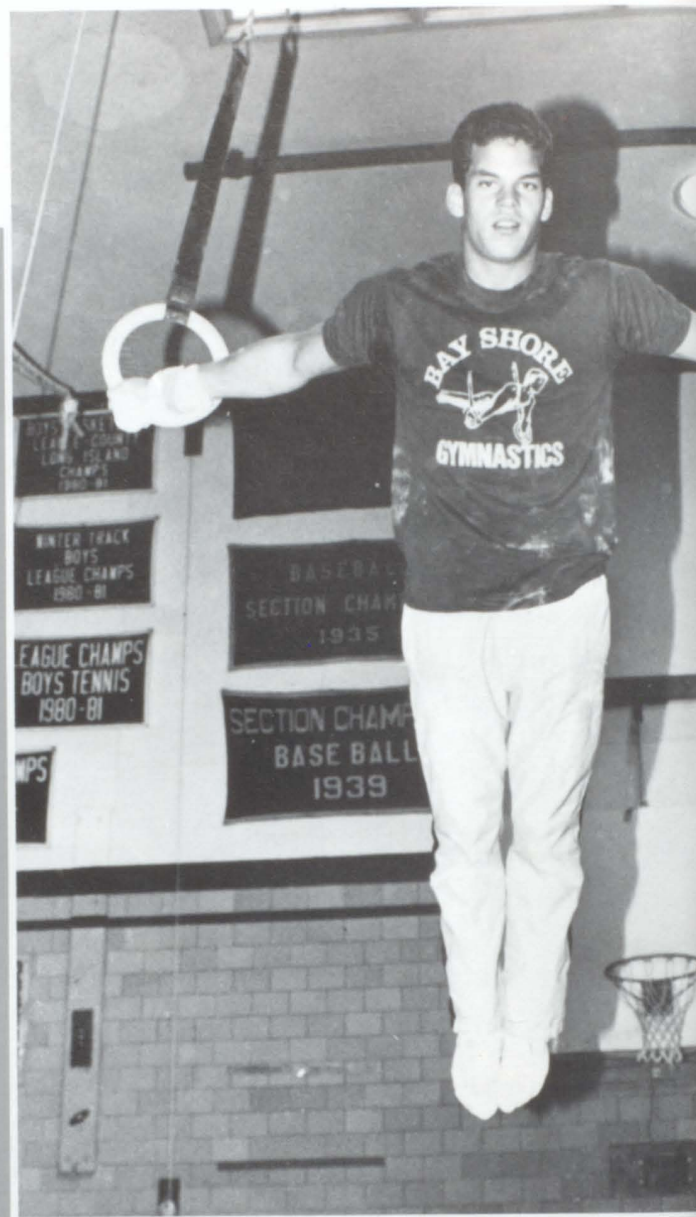

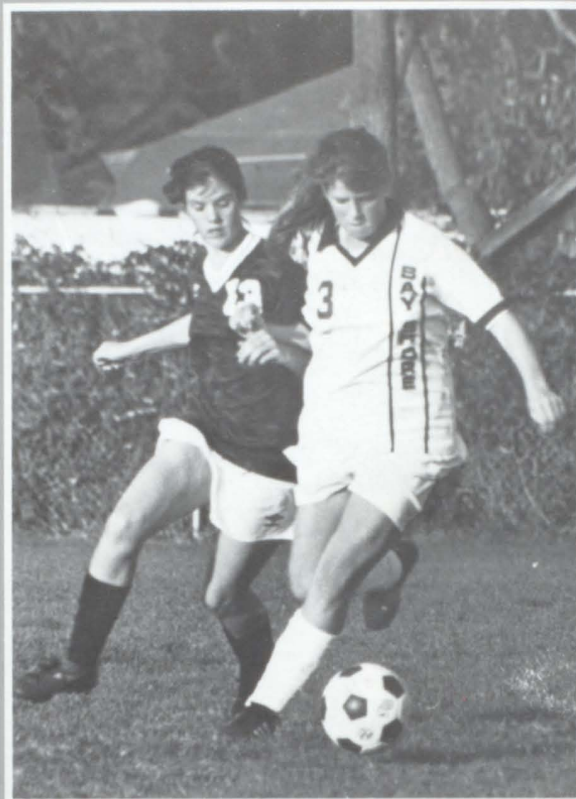

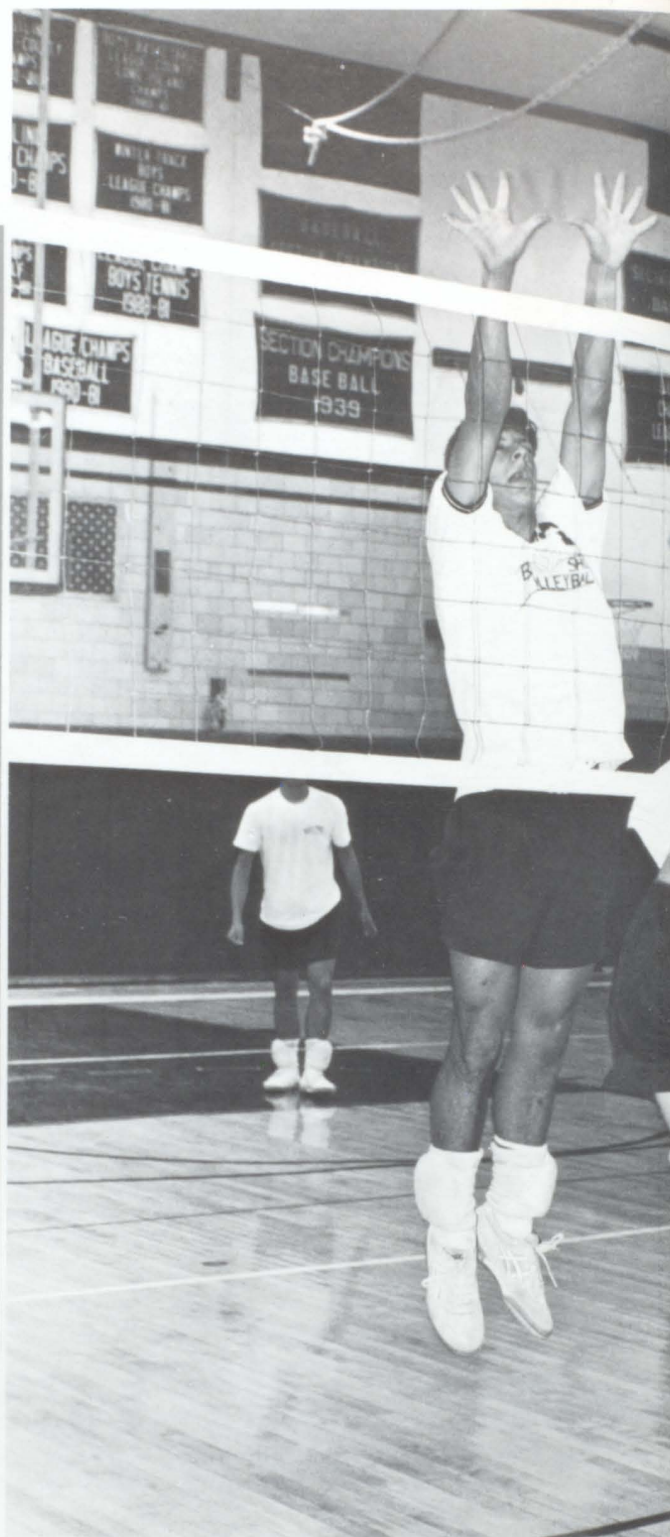

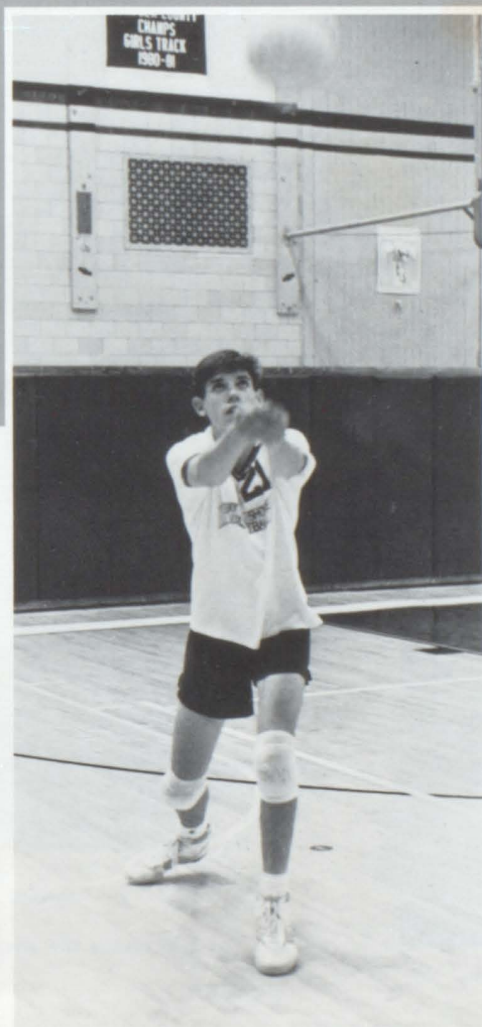

That's the Way the Ball Bounces

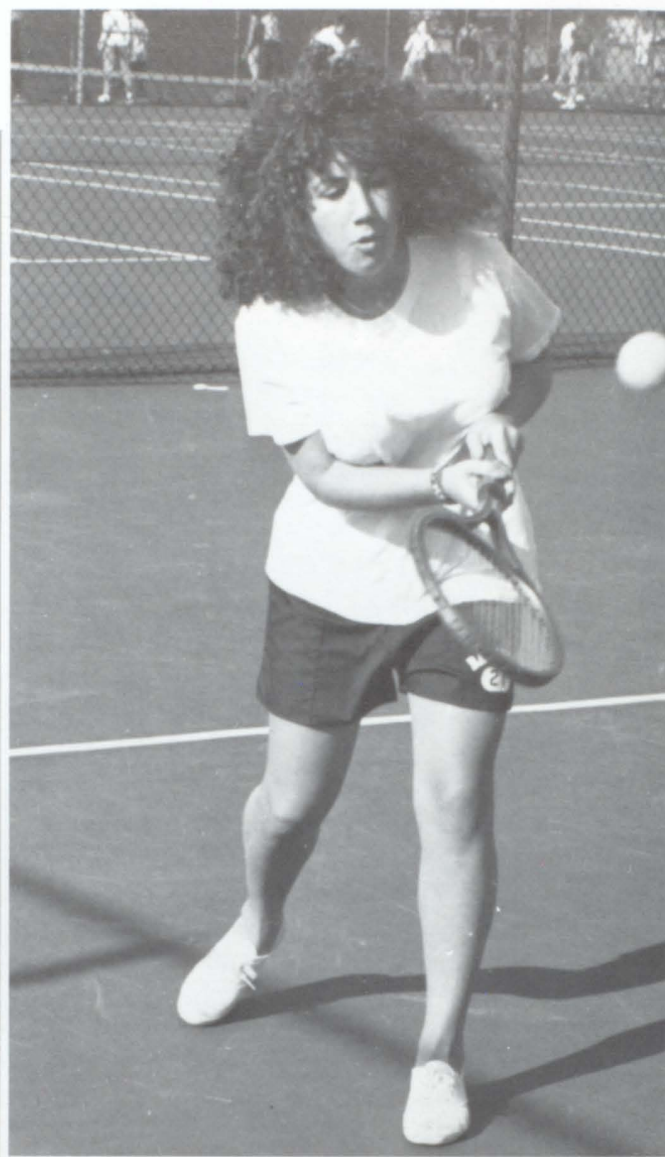

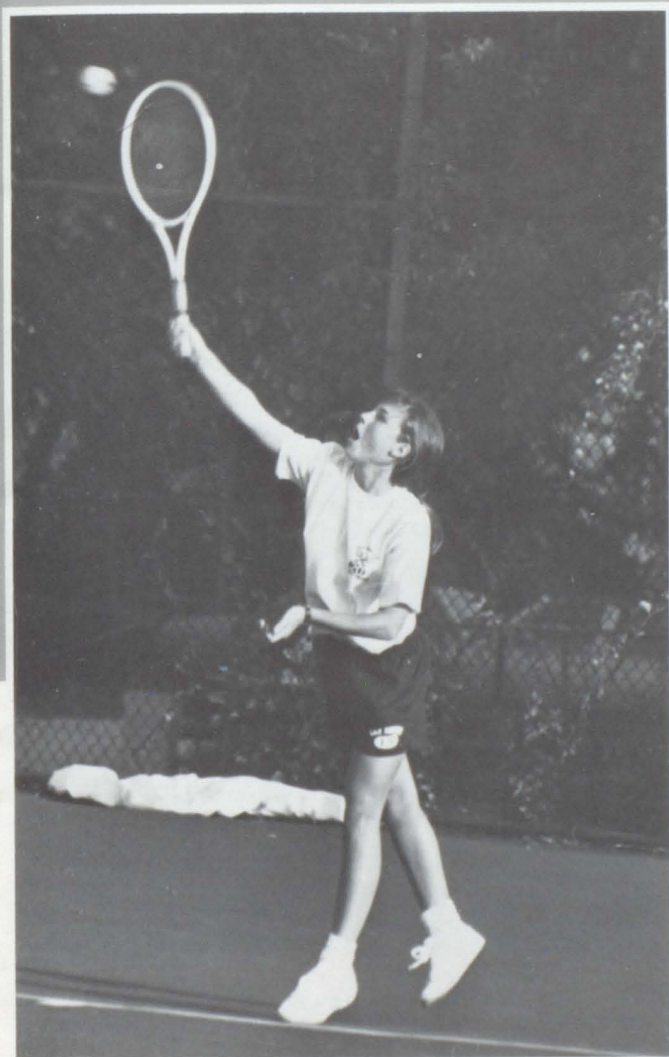
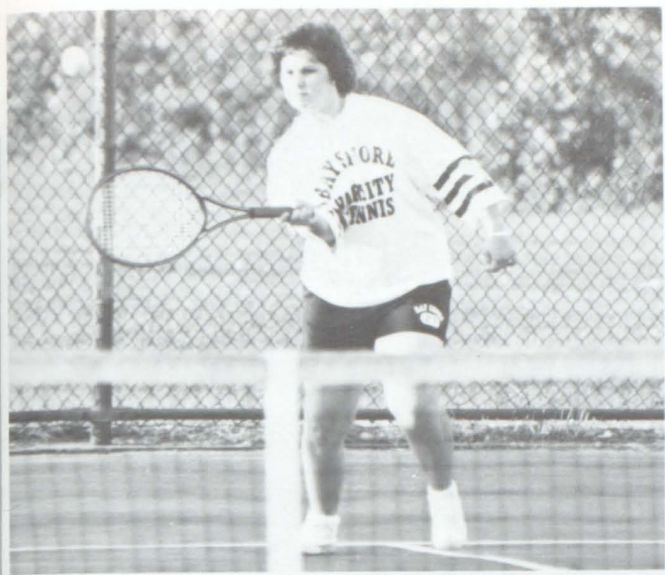

Over the past fifty years many fine athletes have passed through the hallowed halls of Bay Shore High School. In the last year, steps were finally taken to honor these past and present greats.

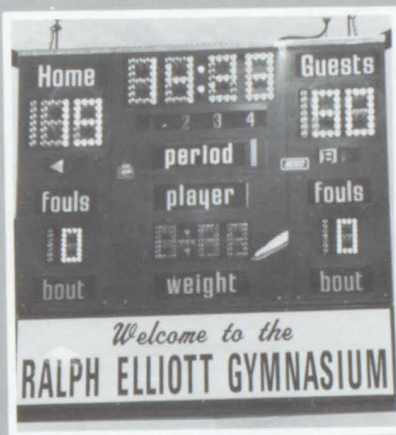

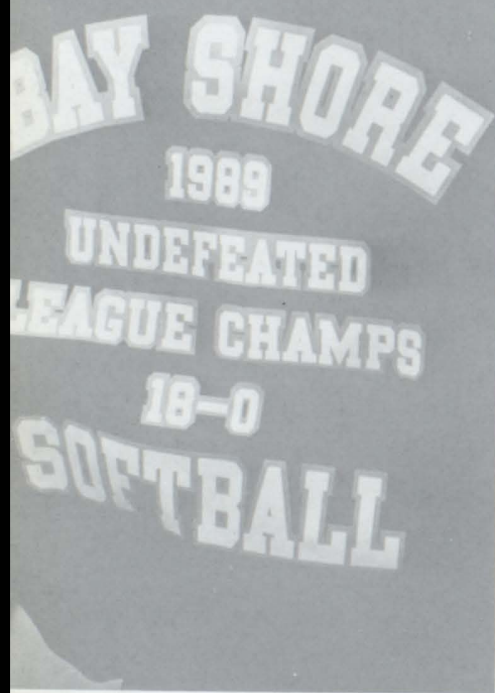
Leader's Club

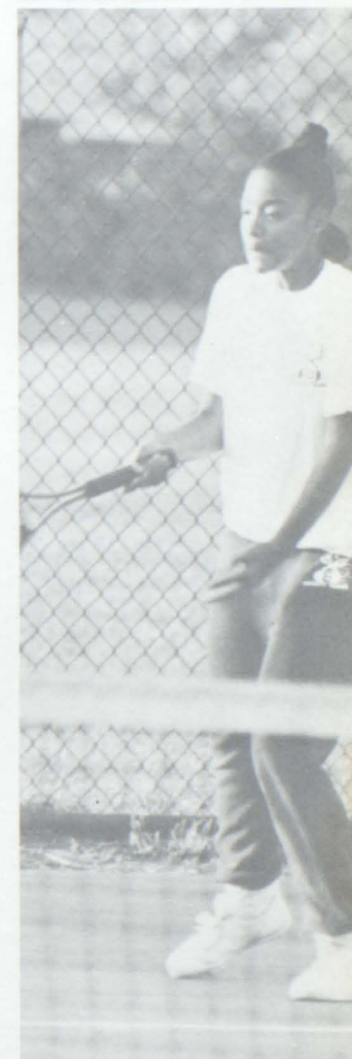
Athletes Offer Help

Marauder Muscles In Motion

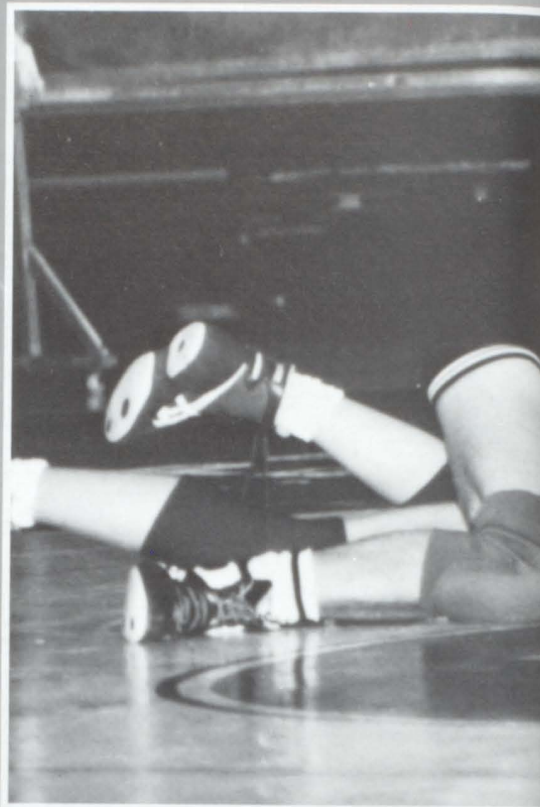

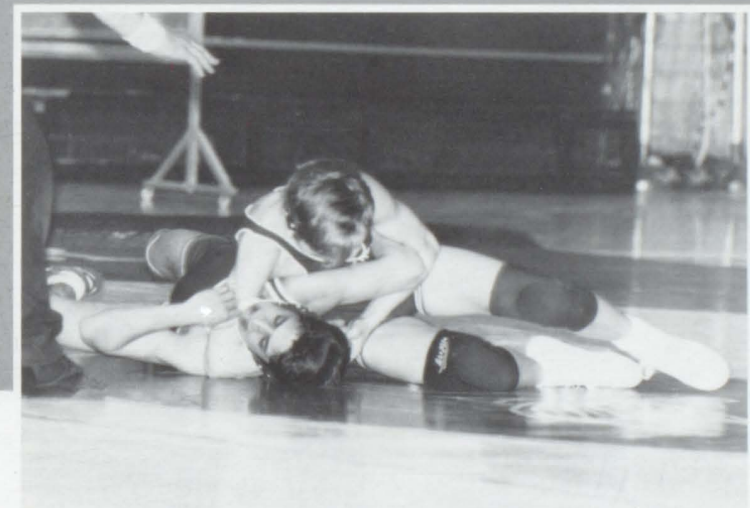
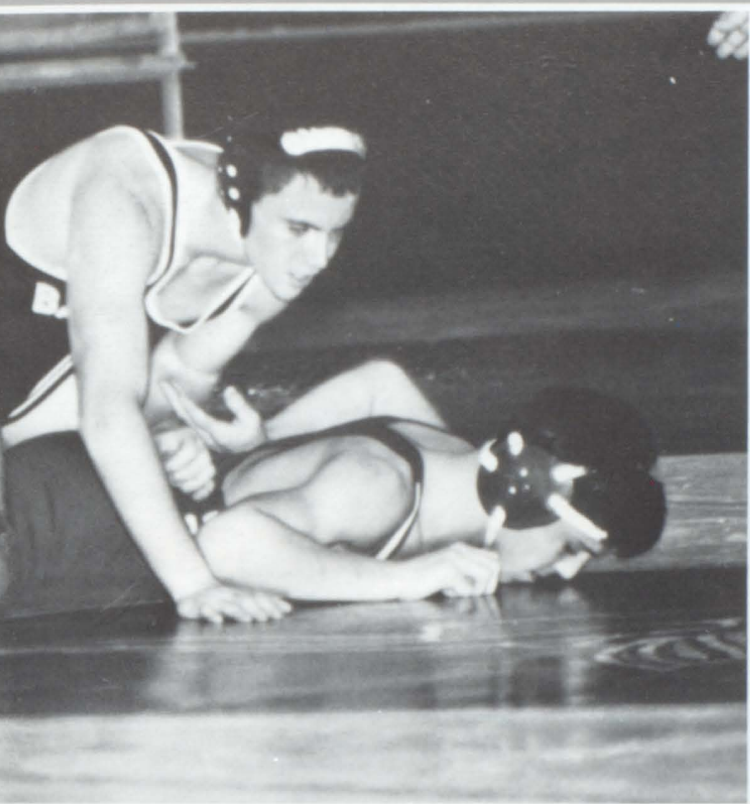

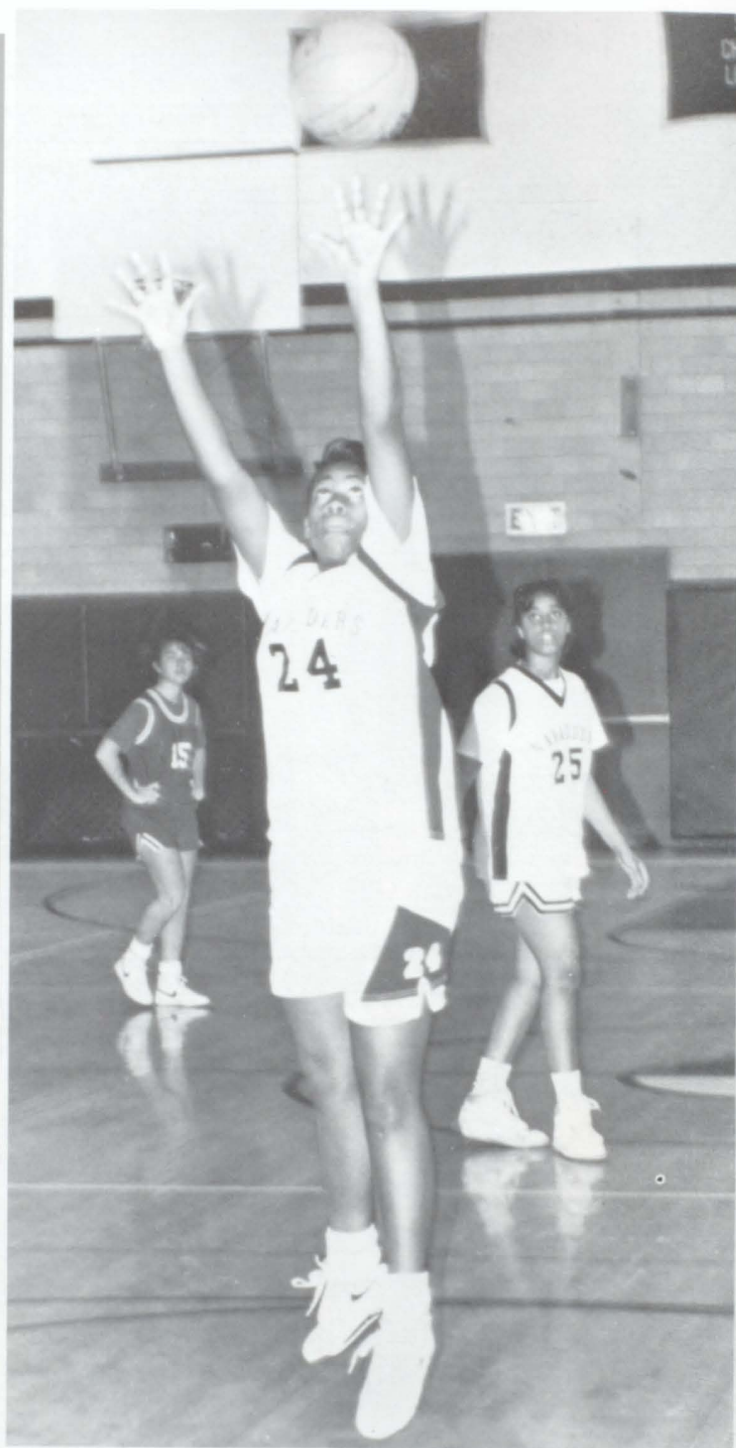
Rebuilding

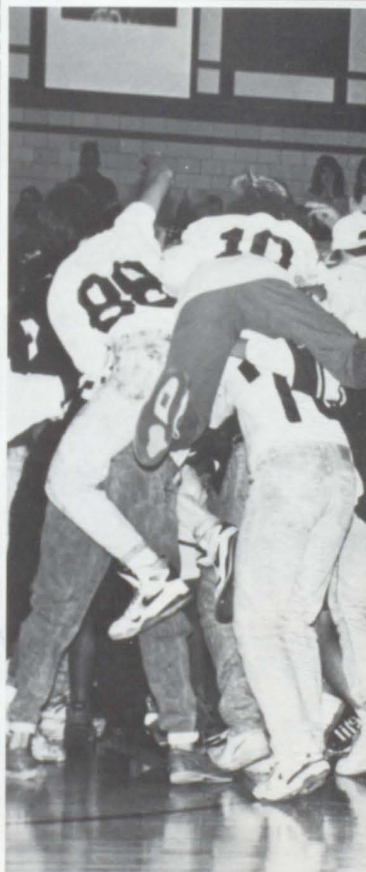

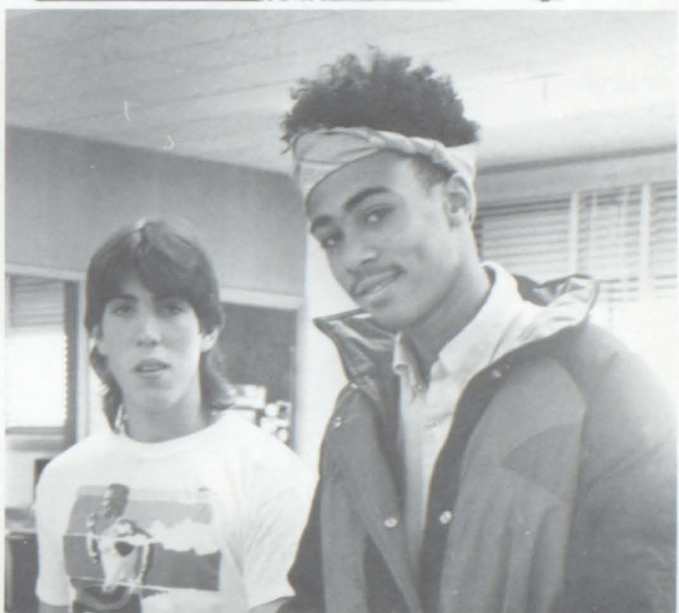

It's a Pitch and a Hit

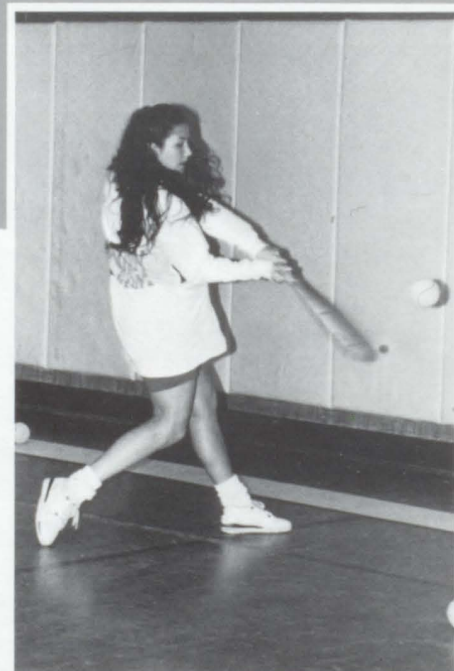
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s spring slowly envelops Bay Shore, the first sound that foreshadows the beginning of an exciting sports season is the sound of a bat against an accelerating softball.

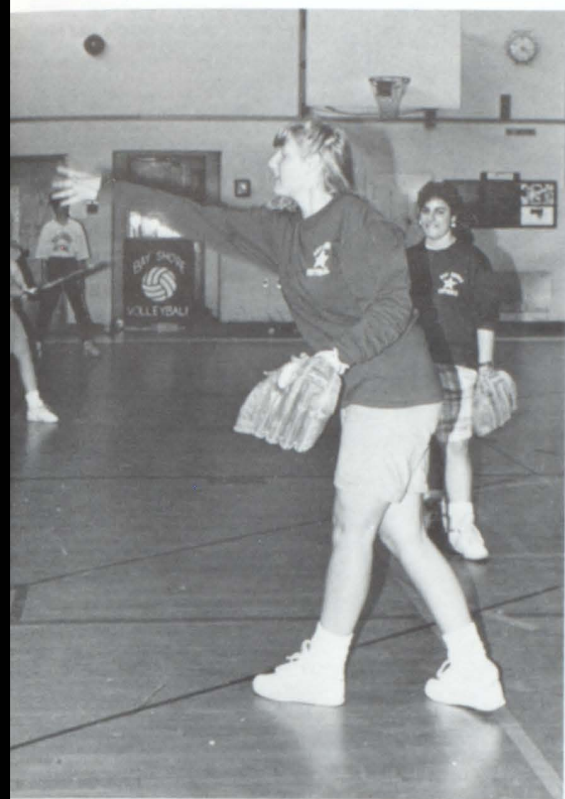

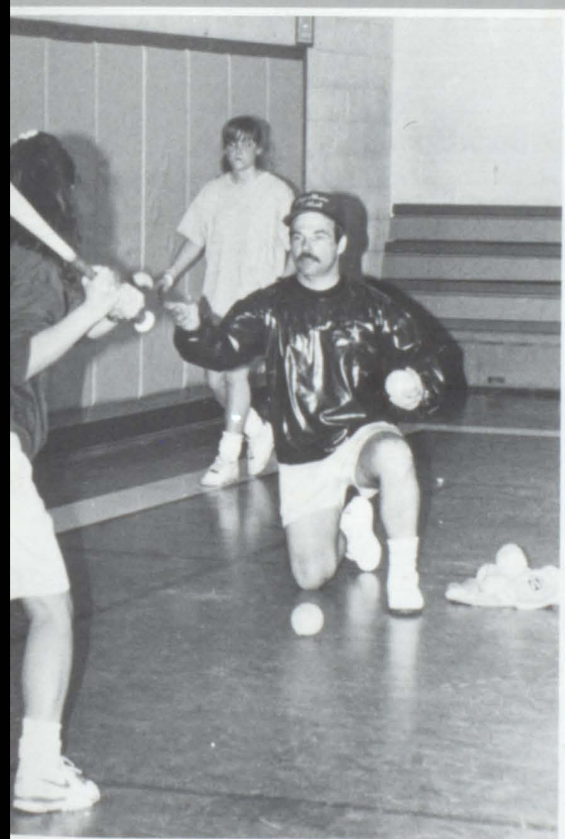

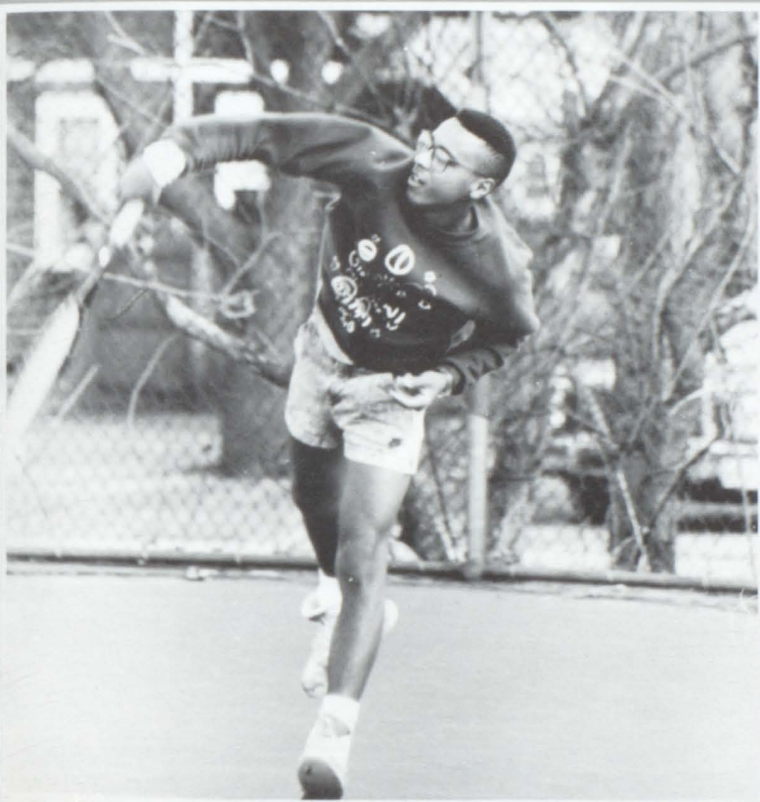

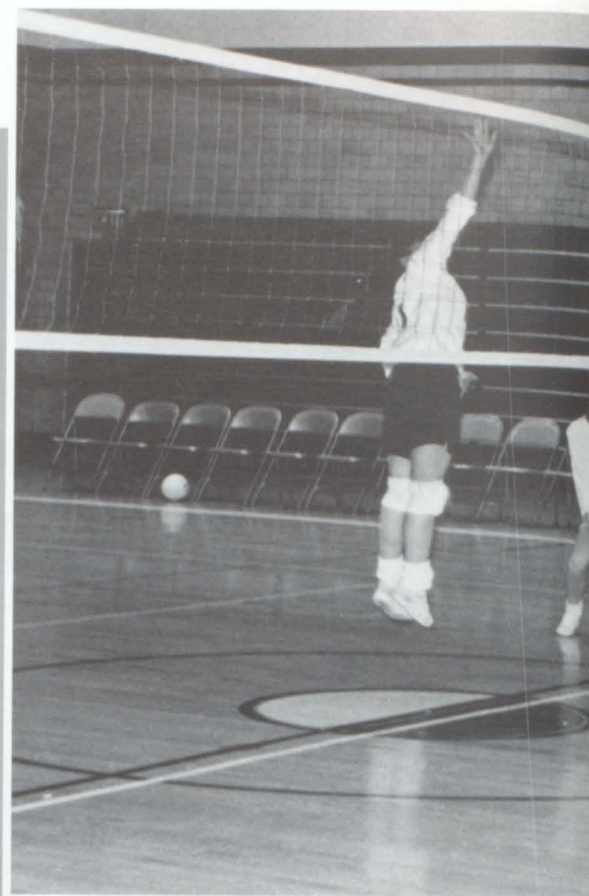
A Bump Above

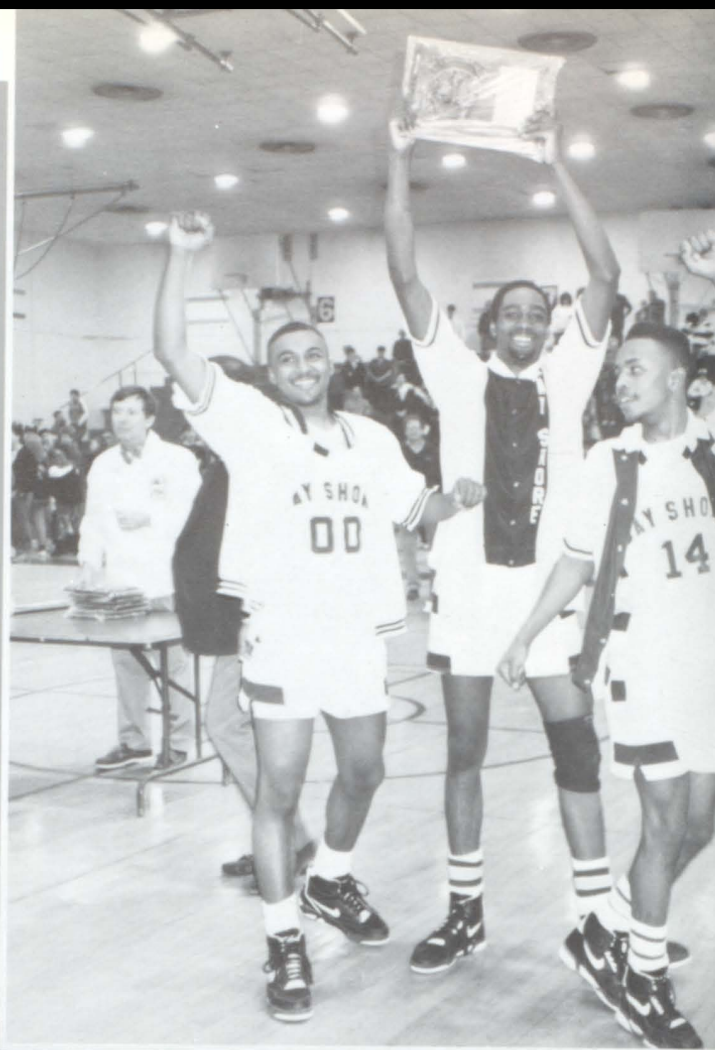

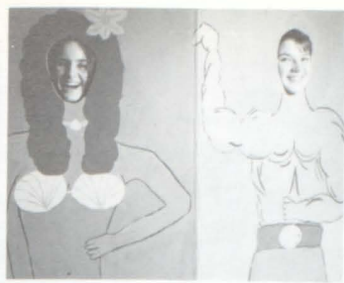

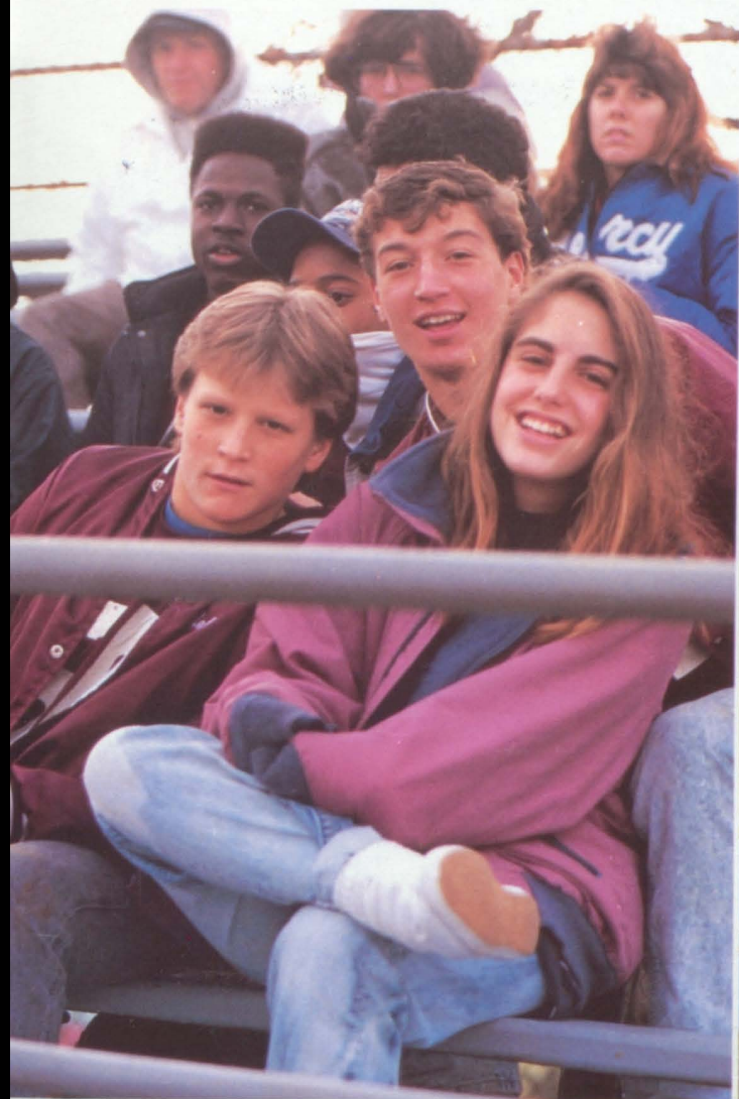

Recreating the classic sounds of Charlie Parker or keeping up with the latest works by Bob Mintzer or Maynard Ferguson is the High School Jazz Ensemble. Under the direction of Mr. T. Scalzo, this elite group of twenty musicians studies and performs a great variety of music styles. Members of the band gain valuable experience by playing the most recent releases of many successful jazz artists recording today.

In addition to learning how to play complex rhythms with style and interpretation, all the students study the art of improvisation. The best are given the opportunity to solo or to create their own melodies on stage. To help these young musicians, Mr. Scalzo uses synthesizers and other state-of-the-art resources of the school's music theory program.

The band played at the annual Pops Concert in February, at various jazz competitions in and out of the state, and at the Annual Night of Jazz with special musical guests baritone saxophonist Denis DiBlasio, formerly of the Maynard Ferguson band, and George Rabbai, a trumpet player

who has played with such artists as Woody Herman. In addition to performing with the ensemble, Mr. DiBlasio and Mr. Rabbai conducted clinics and instructional sessions with all music students in the school.

Three members of this year's band were selected to perform in the All-County Jazz Ensemble; these three are acoustic and electric bassist Vincent Basciano, bass trombonist Dave Pancake, and trombonist Chris Marson, who was also selected to play with the All-State Ensemble.

With a growing interest in Bay Shore's music program, including theory classes which teach methods of composition and creativity, Director Scalzo anticipates a continued high level of achievement from his students.

The last fifty years have been characterized by rapid changes in the film industry, politics, and everyday life. As many people have stated, if one doesn't stop to enjoy life, he might miss it. Names are always being altered, and faces are constantly changing, just ask Michael Jackson.

Most stars of the past are only vague memories to our generation, and they have been replaced by some of the most talented individuals that the music and movie industries have ever seen. Howdy Doody may have thrilled children of the past, but the Muppets and Disney characters, like Mickey Mouse, have been a sign of the changing times. Chuck Berry and Ella Fitzgerald are out, Madonna and Milli Vanilli are in; the

Technology has come a long way and experienced many successes since 1939 and 1940, too. Automobiles, bicycles, stereos, and airplanes, have made great strides, also.

A wide variety of political issues have

Over the course of the year, the quality of the articles increased as budding journalists were taught successful methods of interviewing and investigative reporting.

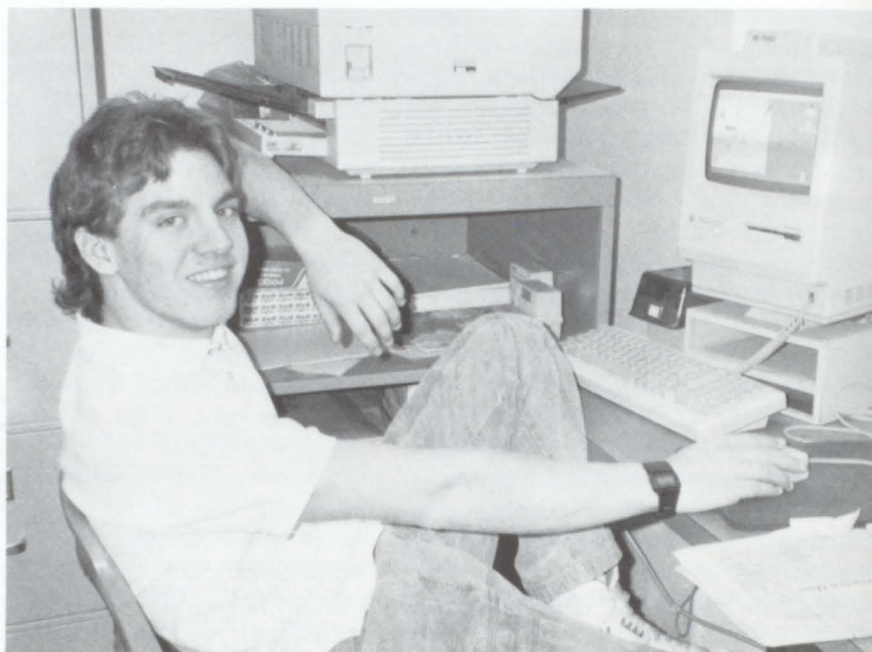

STUDENT LAWYERS

mock trial and moot court

For a good part of the latter half of this year, thirteen Bay Shore students worked in close conjunction with two practicing trial attorneys. On March fifth, six of these students, three lawyers and three witnesses, brought a fictional case to court against the team from LaSalle Military Academy.

The Mock Trial program is designed to provide interested and motivated students an opportunity to demonstrate their legal knowledge in a courtroom setting. Each match is decided by an attorney or district court judge who makes two decisions. The first is the determination as to whether the plaintiff or the defendant would win the case legally. Although academically interesting, this de-

cision is second in importance to the one that determines which team will continue in the competition. The judge reaches this decision based on the performances and legal abilities of each team.

In addition to the statewide Mock Trial competition, the team performed an exhibition trial at the rededication ceremony of the High School building. Also, they participated in a weekend tournament in Harrison, New York. There, teams comprised of two lawyers and one witness were given fifteen minutes to prepare, and then take the podium against the best teams in Westchester County. Last year's team left a tough act to follow, winning first, second, third, and fourth

places.

Students involved in the program are given the chance to investigate and debate important legal issues. This year's primary case, involving sexual harassment in the workplace, was considered so controversial that one high school removed itself from competition. With three students in an internship program with the team, six returning players, and a strong Moot Court program, Coach Mr. R. Richardson feels that Bay Shore will continue to enjoy a commanding position in Suffolk County for years to come.

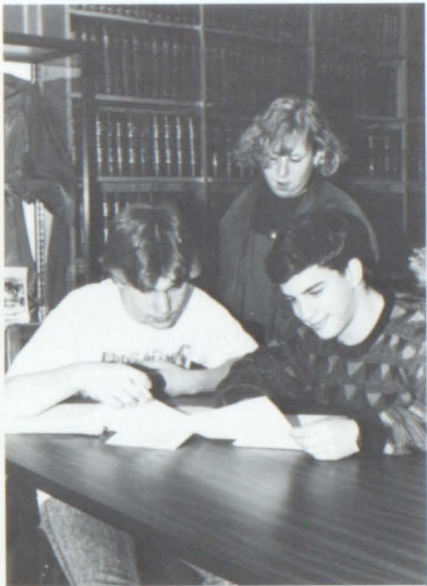
better, using the rigorous Mock Trial standards as a guide.

Fashion Show 1989

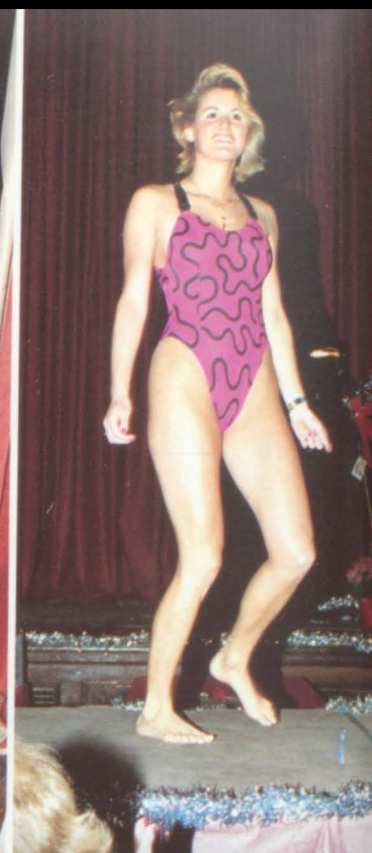

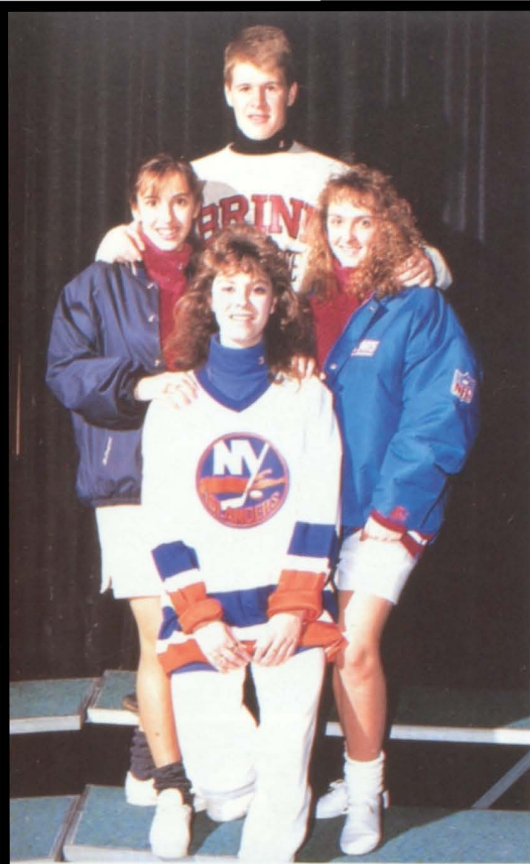

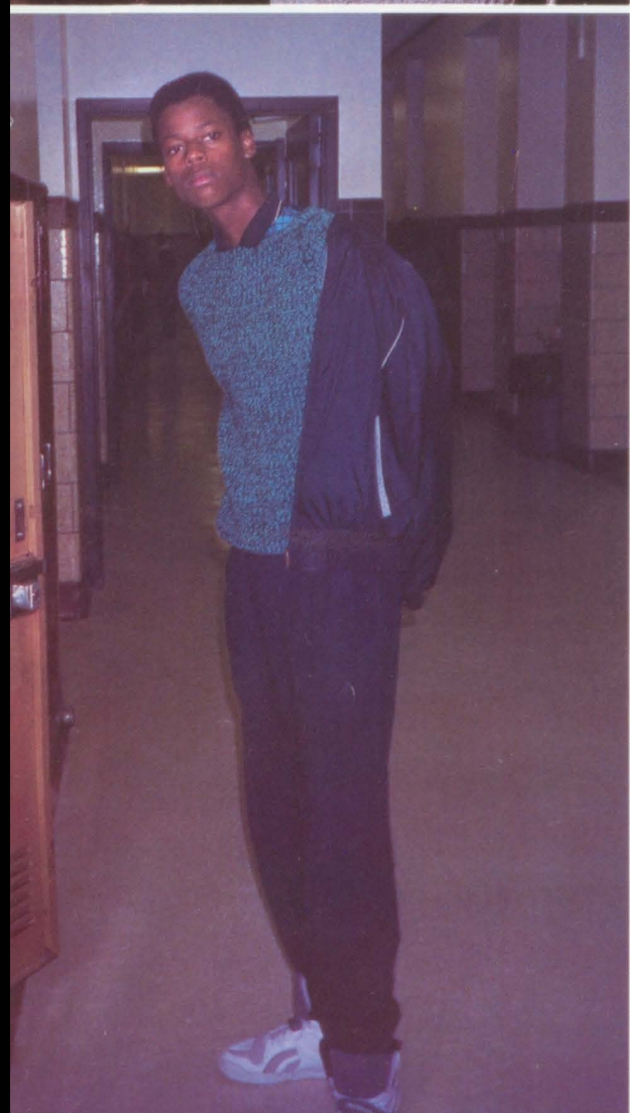

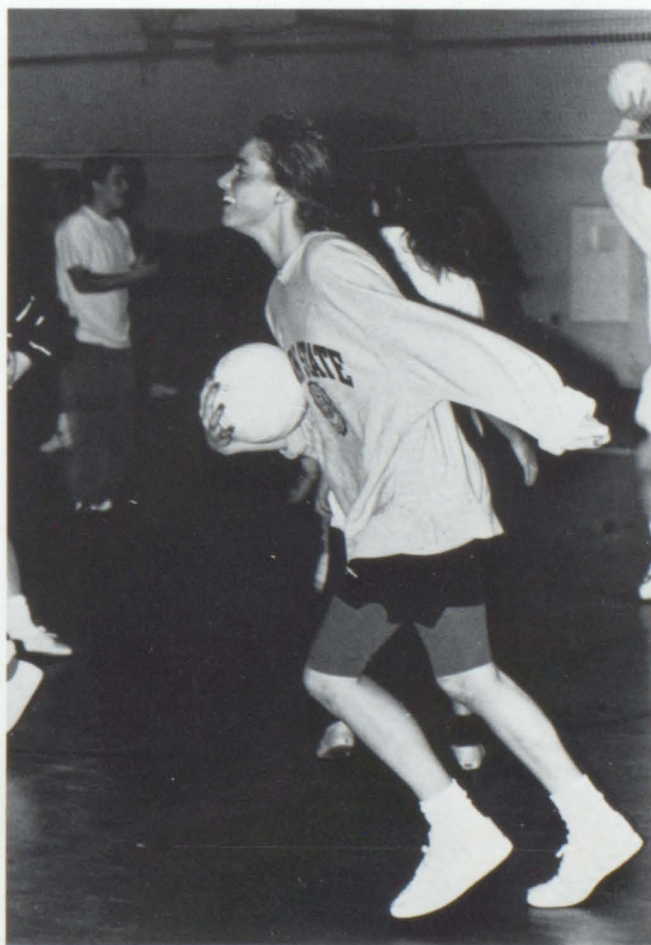

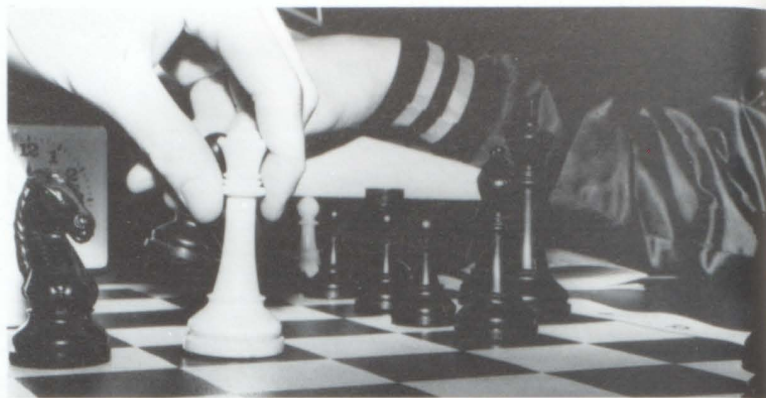

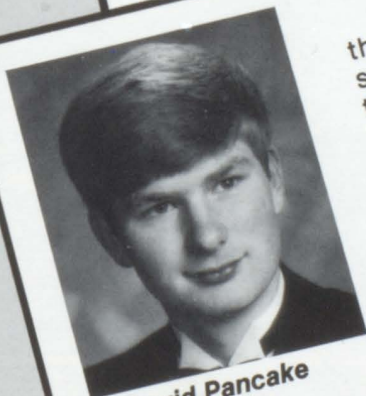

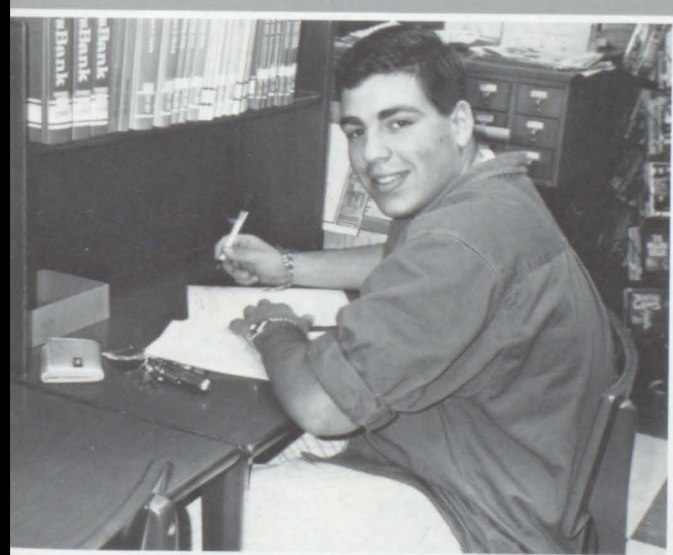

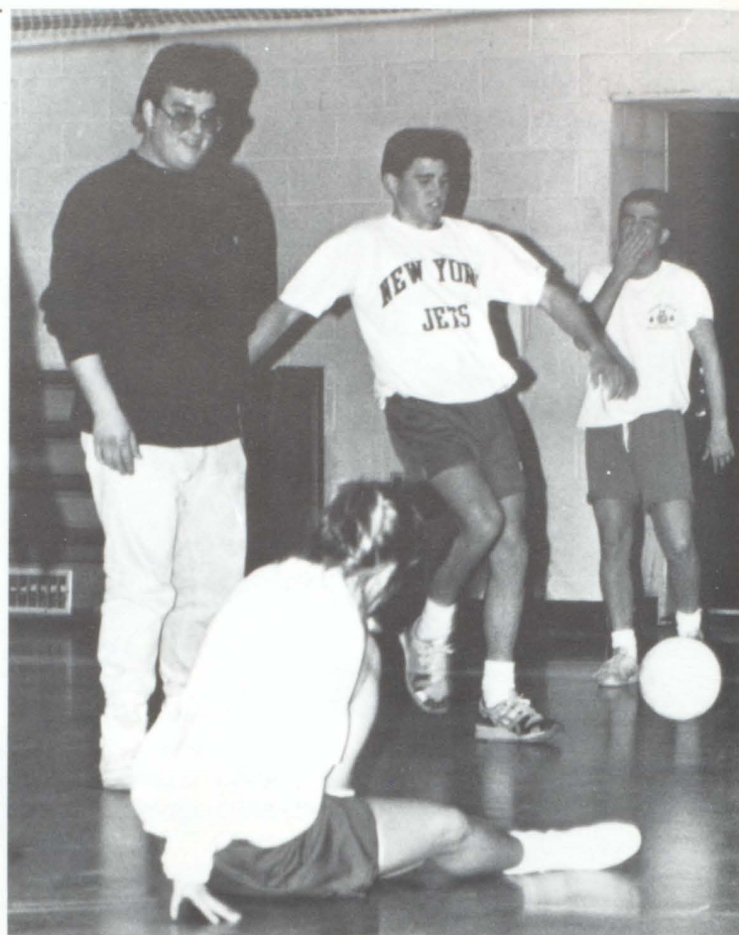
