
A MAGIC CARPET RIDE


UNLOCKING THE MAGIC


THE MAGIC WITHIN US!


What makes a person want to open up their hearts to 135 of their peers? With an abundance of people, varying in backgrounds and personalities, Awareness Weekend brought many people closer together.


ed drug addiction, alcoholism and AIDS.

Caren and Tim also agreed on another thing. They can't wait to be Seniors. They look forward to being the oldest in the school and being role models for the underclassmen.





SOPHOMORES PATIENTLY SEEK A VOICE OF THEIR OWN!



"I think that the Renaissance Program motivates students and gives them the opportunity to achieve their goals," stated senior Zach Humphrey



endeavors. With two more years of high school to go, the sophomore class strived to make sure that each year was as memorable as the next.




A WHOLE NEW WORLD FOR FRESHMEN!

Advised by Ms. K. Picco the council worked together in a close-knit unit exemplifying their unity as a group.


Along with wanting to be the most spirited the Freshman Council also wanted to help out in the community. They did this during the Christmas season by adopting a less fortunate family for the holidays.



A Career in the Making






"It's challenging," said Kerri Berka. "It's a way for us to get to-


Miss J. Kranzle, a member of the ninth






When asked why he decided to become a teacher, Mr. Bell replied, "As I go back to when I wanted to become a teacher, all I can remember is how satis-

Mr. Bell will certainly be missed by the students and teachers at the High School. He is a wonderful, caring, and concerned teacher who dedicated his life to his profession.



New Technology








musicians. The blends achieved by the choir, including the Madrigals and men's Octet, had alumni jealous that those songs were not sung when they were students here.




Eleven Together As One





A Surplus of Spirit















Pride & Dedication





A Slamming Tradition


With five minutes until tip-off, the gymnasium was overflowing with enthusiastic fans, each one ready to make some noise and cheer on the Marauder Basketball team.




"The guys bowled better and better as the year went on. Practice and team togetherness really paid off," said Kevin Lyons.









The J.V. team enjoyed its time on the field as well. This is really an opportunity to improve and perfect their skills in preparation for the heavy competition at the varsity level.

















FBLA started out the year with new goals and objectives. They went on many trips including spending a day in New York City,





Students in Mr. D. McGilvray's computer club, journeyed down to room 110B to play games, do homework, or just experiment, letting their imaginations run wild. The air



joined this group," said sophomore Kelly Schroder.



These groups were truly magical as they sang together and built lasting friendships throughout the year.










