















SUNRISE TO SUNSET


Although there was such a wide variety of fashion, there was always one thing everyone at Bay Shore thought was in fashion-dedication, responsibility, and spirit.


In Auto Mechanic class, students learn skills to maintain and repair cars, which may lead to a future career after graduation.












HOMECOMING'95






Sophomores Are Smartest!




As the end of the school year approached, several members of the professional staff looked to broaden their horizons beyond the world of Bay Shore High School and decide to take their retirement.




A REAL FLYING ACE!






The world of academics was made more enjoyable when students had something to look forward to at the end of the day. Extracurricular activities and sports filled many after-









With a handful of members, Mr. R.





 the attorneys for the plaintiff.






Following auditions in December, the students began an intensive rehearsal schedule with the








"I hope we can move the desire and enthusiasm of the players to a winning team," said Coach Mr. C. Jones.










Boys' IV Basketball Shooting from the base line



Bowling Time to spare



year," said Nabila Lester. The world of the freshmen was filled with fun, great learning experiences, and cherished memories.




Sweet Rewards







Later on in the year the format was expanded to include other students who hadn't cut but who had other problems such as fighting in school and substance abuse.







Teachers for the Future


"We kind of keep to ourselves," said STATUS Advisor Mrs. C. Thompsett. "We are the quiet group."


The home was bought by the Severence family with its five kids who up to





The students acquired a special feeling of appreciation for the Barbash family and a better understanding of what it was like being a minority in America.




A Night with the Senior Class


The Class of '96

The cover was made from maroon lexotone vellum, silkscreened with gold letters and an embossed gold design, created by senior Jennifer Thomas. The tan parchment endsheets were embossed with the year of the publication. 475 copies of the 216-page book, which included two full- color signatures and one color tip-in on #80 matte stock were printed. A student supplement will be added to complete the book and will include the closing activities of the '95-96 school year. The standard typeface that was used throughout the book was Ballardvale, and all text was submitted on diskette by utilizing Taylor's Typevision and Directoryvision software programs. This was a publication of the Yearbook Design and Layout and the Creative Writing for Publication classes, under the instruction of Mrs. Carol A. Jones and Mr. Joseph B. D'Antoni.








